- Robert Mitchell videotaped the program with Stan Hutchings' camera from the side, and John Sleeman taped the presentation to include screen. DVDs will be ready for sale at subsequent meetings.
- We have four wireless microphones for use during the meeting
- After the meetings, the various computers should be packed individually with their specific power supply, mouse, etc.

Jim Dinkey's old XP computer got a nasty virus. Central Computers (El Camino near 85) took about 2 weeks, for \$29 virus removal and OS reinstallation. He recommends Central Computers for this kind of work if you need it.

- Jim's backups saved his data;
 - **Acronis** is what he uses.
 - **Microsoft Security Essentials** (MSE) is recommended.
 - **M-Secure** or **AVG's boot disk** is used to scan a suspected virus machine.
 - Also use **Malwarebytes**. It would be good to run the scan on ALL partitions and drives attached to the computer.
 - **DO NOT be fooled by pop-up offers, or phone call reporting you have viruses and offering to clean**

your computer! It is a scam to trick you into installing a virus. Be careful about clicking on links in email; they may be scams. The Sunnyvale Senior Center will install Linux for you, which will greatly reduce your risk of infections.

PRESENTATION

A Holy Grail of Bioinformatics: Automatic Constructions of Metabolic Models from Sequenced Genomes

Bioinformatics is a new field, at the intersection of computer science and biology. There are many ways to study DNA, and all generate huge amounts of data. The data needs to be evaluated.

DNA is the sequence of the subunits that make up the molecule, series of A, C, G, and T.

The **genome sequence** is the sequence of the DNA molecules. About 3.2 Billion bases for the human genome. About 5,000 genomes have been sequenced.

Proteins have about 20 chemical subunits. Their triplets are translated into DNA code.

Genes are about 1.5% of the human genome. Today we can predict function for about 50% of the 95% of genes found in bacteria.

The **cell** is a self-replicating machine.

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An **enzyme** is a protein that accelerates a chemical reaction. An enzyme is encoded by one or more genes.

Metabolism is the set of cellular chemical reactions.

A **metabolic model** predicts the rates of cellular reactions in different situations. This allows prediction of unculturable bacteria; predicting anti-bacterial drug targets; accelerating biofuel production through **metabolic engineering**.

The Grail is writing programs that find genes and predict their functions, ideally a purely automated program.

The solution entails Gene Finding

Gather examples of X; find patterns that X shares in common; find a program that recognizes those patterns; evaluate accuracy of the program.

Statistical analysis can determine genes from non-gene sequences.

To predict the function of a gene, determine the biochemical reaction the protein catalyzes;

- the transport reaction enabled by the protein;
- does the protein bind to turn expression on or off;
- there are other techniques, too.

One approach: compare the sequence of protein P1 to the sequences of all other known proteins. Find a protein P2 with the most-similar sequence by using inexact string matching.

Human ATP synthase was compared to e. coli ATP synthase. It was found to be extremely similar, due to conservation of function. There are some differences, due to mutation over time.

Reactome Inference: For each protein, what reaction(s) does it catalyze? Reactions can be specified by matching enzyme names (protein function)

MetaCyc: Metabolic Encyclopedia describes metabolic pathways, reactions, enzymes and compounds; Literature based database with extensive references and commentary. A collection of 1,900 pathway/genome databases. It is a resource that can be used by researchers

Flux-Balance Analysis: obtain a steady state constraint based quantitative model of metabolism. Nutrients go through a metabolic path to result in secretions.

LOOKING AHEAD, WE HAVE QUESTIONS

We discussed broadening the scope of SPAUG to all Technology, rather than just PC. Most were in favor, but some were concerned about the rest of the membership.

Some felt that many attend SPAUG for PC information, and if we broadened the scope, they would stop attending.

Others did not share that opinion, especially since many recent General Meeting-programs have not been PC related.

Perhaps part of our plateauing in membership and increasing average age of members is due to our limited scope. Back in the early days, PC users needed support of gurus and a source of programs. Now the PC and its software are commodities, and few younger folk "look under the hood". However, they are interested in the new technologies coming out, and this interest could be used to attract new members.

We have to poll our members to find out what they want, and decide if we want to attract younger members. Maury Green offered to create a form that could be sent to all members asking their views on this, and also future meeting topics they would like us to pursue.

NEW BUSINESS

- Considering the possibility of using PayPal for dues and other payments, Maury Green provided the following, via email, Sunday, March 17 2013]:

For a standard account PayPal charges 2.9% + \$0.30 per transaction. That would be \$1.17 for a \$30 membership payment. Payers may either use their PayPal account (linked to their bank account) if they have one or they may use any major credit card and PayPal keeps the information on file so they only have to enter it once. Also the credit card information is not given to the merchant (us). I personally use my credit card with PayPal and find it a very convenient and more secure way to pay for things on the internet.

As a new feature, PayPal now offers a credit card swipe device which can be used with your smart phone. The reader is free and the use charge per swipe is 2.7%. So if Bev or someone at the meeting had one, they could accept membership payments by credit card on the spot.

Finally, the feature that SVCS is using is the PayPal invoice. This is a free service. Our treasurer can sign in to the SVCS PayPal account and generate an email invoice to the member(s). The invoice template can be customized with our logo, name, etc. The invoice has a PayPal 'Pay Now' button on it. When the member clicks on the but-

ton he/she is taken to the PayPal site where they can pay. Or, if they choose, the member can pay by check.

All the money collected is held in our PayPal account until we transfer it to our bank account.

I feel PayPal service is worth the small fee for the convenience to both us and the members.

T9ABC TEXT ENTRY

T-9, which stands for **Text on 9 keys**, is a patented predictive text technology for **mobile phones** (specifically those that contain a 3x4 numeric keypad). Originally developed by Tegic Communications, now part of Nuance Communications.

T9 allows words to be entered by a single keypress for each letter, as opposed to the multi-tap approach used in conventional mobile phone text entry, in which several letters are associated with each key, and selecting one letter often requires multiple keypresses.

It combines the groups of letters on each phone key with a fast-access dictionary of words. It looks up in the dictionary all words corresponding to the sequence of keypresses and orders them by frequency of use. As T9 gains familiarity with the words and phrases the user commonly uses, it speeds up the process by offering the most frequently used words first and then lets the user access other choices with one or more presses of a predefined Next key.

The dictionary can be expanded by adding missing words, enabling them to be recog-

nized in the future. After introducing a new word, the next time the user tries to produce that word T9 will add it to the predictive dictionary.

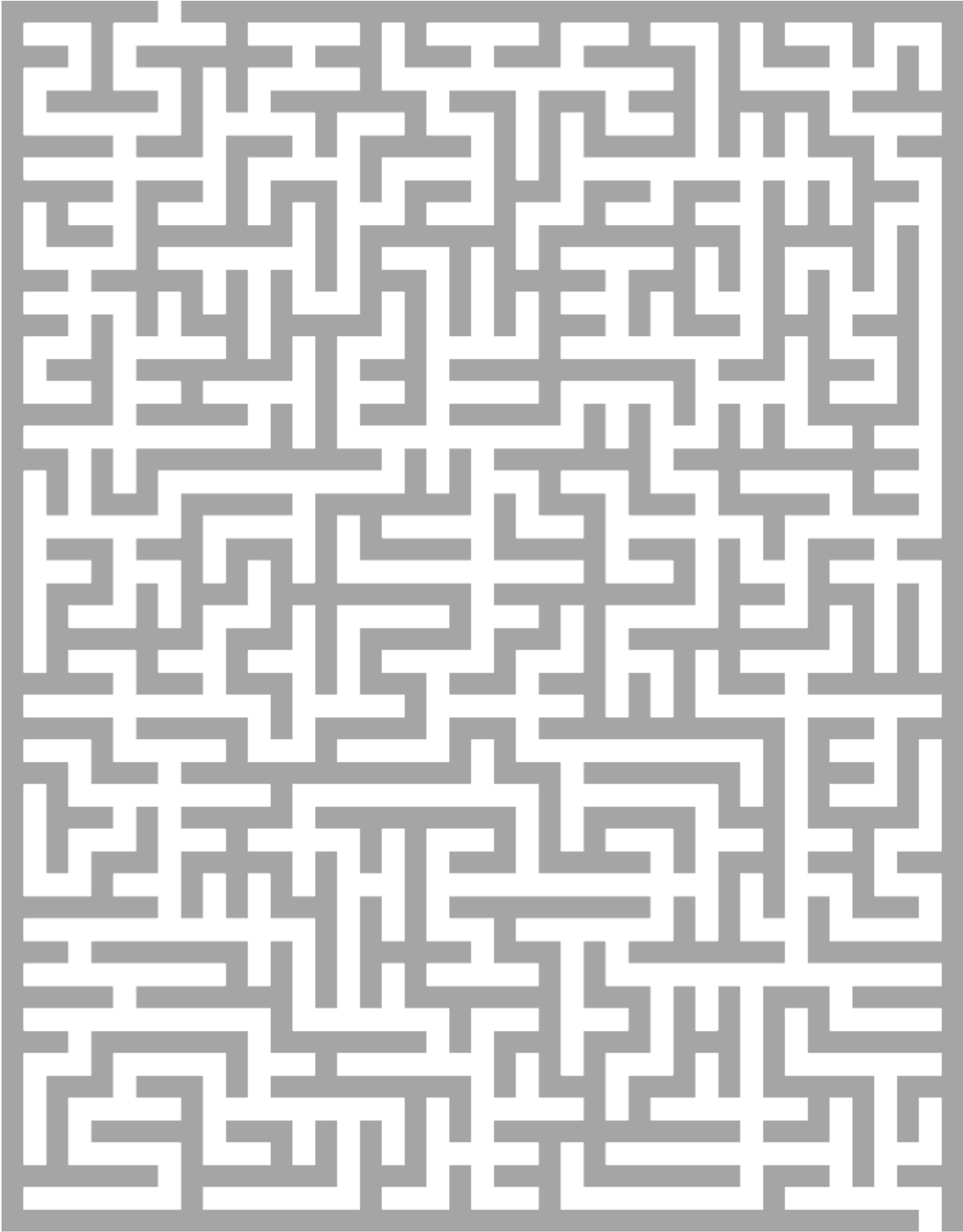
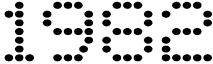
