CROSSTALK

- **Printer does not give output that looks like the screen.** A difficult issue, Google-search and/or contact the printer manufacturer. May be a driver needs updating or the program needs to be re-installed.
- **iPhone settings: wifi on/off. Sometimes the router light is on even though the iPhone is off.** It may be that another device is communicating. The light just shows activity, not on/off condition. Make sure you have a good password.
- **Firefox gives a pop-up that may be malware.** Blocking does not seem to work. The solution was to go to Google Chrome. Activation of pop-up blocker should prevent the pop-up.

- **A TV card stopped working with a new motherboard.** A missing driver may be the problem; but checking device driver said all OK.
- **If Safely Eject doesn't work,** Close the applications that were reading/writing to it. As a last resort, shut down the computer.

PROTECTING YOURSELF, YOUR COMPUTER AND YOUR IDENTITY— PRESENTATION BY BOB GOSTISCHA

- Bob was here courtesy of Avast [anti malware]. The Corporate version is now available for schools, colleges, and Libraries at no cost. www.avast.com/en-us/education.
- There is no perfect antivirus program.
- New viruses come out all the time.
- Create an image backup regularly.
- Your personal information is at greatest risk.
- Only run one AV programs at a time.
- Always remove your current virus program before changing AV applications. Use the add/remove function to remove the program, followed by the uninstaller program provided by each Security Program manufacturer.
- Avast! 8 is free. It is low overhead so does not use much CPU. When an update for programs you're using or for your operating system is available, do it immediately; don't wait.
- Don't click at random.
- Use a good password

- Keep security up while gaming
- Avoid P2P and pirated software.
- Social Engineering Attacks are rampant. If you don't know them, they are not your friend.
- Signs you are infected:
 1. popup ads appear;
 2. browser navigation is redirected;
 3. an unknown security program gives warnings;
 4. posts that you did not post appear on your social media pages/
- Ransomware is common; never pay the ransom.
- Use your recovery disk after you run a Linux cleanup program.
- 60% infections come from "legitimate" sites that are corrupted. There is no "safe surfing"; even "good" sites can be infected. Even Google searches can be redirected.
- A fake cleanup pops up, and anywhere you click will infect you. Pull the Internet plug if this happens, shut down the computer, clear the Temp folder and full scan for malware.
- Email Fax Notification is a popular guise.
- Avast uses virus signature, heuristics, behavioral, cloud and communityIQ to detect malware.

CommunityIQ receives 50,000 suspected viruses per day. They are studied and updates are devised. Avast updates continually when you are online.

- Some add-ons will add value, but free alternatives can provide the same function.

- Avast already has much more functionality than their competitors.
- For social network users, use a strong password—at least 6 characters, but as long as possible.

Keep a copy on your refrigerator or somewhere else, **not** on the computer.

The social network is PUBLIC, there is no privacy on the Internet.

Manage your privacy settings.

Avoid 3rd party applications.

- Keep your AV up to date.
- Update programs whenever it's available.
- PRISM is used by the NSA and FBI. There is no privacy. Facebook has partnered with Avast! to protect users.
- Always create a Restore Point before installing new software.
- Do NOT use the Default method of installing. Always use the Custom installation.

Be sure to uncheck the things you don't want, usually toolbars. There are tools to get rid of toolbars if necessary.

- Beware of "verify your activity" email
- Hover the mouse over a link to see where it is really going.
- There is a Comcast phishing scheme that looks legit, but links to a website in Russia.
- Don't click a link in an email; go the company's website via a known path.
- Emailed fake delivery notices, purportedly from FedEx, US Mail, Ama-

- zon.com, and probably others are common..
- Contact www.idtheftcenter.org/ if you are a victim of identity theft. There is a list of steps, and it takes a long time.
 - Use Malwarebytes.org/, Piriform.com/, [ccleaner](http://ccleaner.com/) (registry cleaner is risky)
 - WinPatrol Cloud www.winpatrol.com Monitors changes, will warn about programs that want to run.
 - Avast! free mobile security is a good idea. It's currently only for Android. iPhone security is in Beta, looking for volunteers.
 - Avast free also available for Apple and Linux.
 - There is no hard-media (i.e., CD or DVD) version available; only online.
 - In case of suspected attempted infection (i.e. a suspicious pop-up), get off the Internet, shut down, scan on boot, preferably from Safe Mode.
 - Malwarebytes, MS Security Essentials, and Avast can run simultaneously.

With the upcoming End of Support (EOS) for MS' Windows XP, there was a lively exchange of emails among Planning Committee members following the Wed 7/24/13 Planning Meeting and continuing through Friday evening 7/26/13. I'll try to give an accurate summary here, and I invite you to

- **John Sleeman**—Sometime next year, Jim Dinkey reminded us, XP will be unsupported. Maybe a lot of people are like me in having computers which fail the Win7 upgrade test. Maybe there will be a move to Linux, finally, after much palaver.

I suspect many of us would rather not fork out for a new and unfamiliar OS on an old machine, nor for a new machine. My limited exposure to Linux suggests it is or can be made more familiar than Win7.

So—should we have a meeting/tutorial/SIG on adding Linux to an XP machine, or just converting over? Very hands-on. Very specific items, like accessing data stored under NTFS, recovering backed-up stuff from Acronis, doing Linux backups, etc. My thought here is that it may not be a continuous process but rather a sudden rush at the end.

- **Maury Green**—The Build It Yourself SIG is oriented to hardware AND OPEN SOURCE SOFTWARE, INCLUDING LINUX.
- **Bill Young**—In the past year, I have installed Ubuntu on the computers of two friends. Both are not computer savvy and were having difficulty moving their computer from XP to Win7. They asked for my help. Since both had rather simple computer needs (no critical Windows software needed), rather than struggle with Win7, I recommended Ubuntu. At least they could try it for free.

I watched and advised as they downloaded, burned a DVD, and installed Ubuntu. The installations went smoothly. Both friends like it, are very happy with it, and have experienced no issues -- at least none they have mentioned to me. Both like the freedom from malware. The daughter of one of the friends used Ubuntu on her father's computer and now wants it on her computer.

I am available to help anyone who feels they need some hand holding installing Ubuntu or Mint.

- **Brad Youngman**—I can help anyone with a Linux installation (Ubuntu or Mint). Just join the Sunnyvale Senior Center (it is inexpensive ~ \$20 or \$30 depending on where you live). FAREWELL TO OPERA?

Opera has been my primary browser and I have been an Opera advocate for years, so it was with some interest that I have been reading about Opera's new version, Opera 15. A lot of what I read said that the Opera team was removing features that I've depended on, so I didn't rush to try Opera 15.

Then, because I'd learned that Opera 15 could coexist with Opera 12, I went ahead

and downloaded/installed Opera 15. As many others have said in sites linked here — <http://tinyurl.com/mkxp2ap> — if the Opera team doesn't give Opera 15's user interface the Opera features I like and depend on, then post-12 Opera is gone from my machine until I learn of a significant change.

OTOH, Opera just made a minor tweak to Opera 12. I recommend this version (12.16), available via—<http://tinyurl.com/lj4grdc>—on this Opera page—<http://www.opera.com/computer>.

Background

We can probably divide Search Engine (SE) history, so far, into two periods—

- Before Google (<1998)
Remember Netscape, Alta Vista, Archie, or any of the other engines of that era?

- The Google Years (≥1998)
We know Google wasn't always here—it began in 1998—but we may wonder how we did without it or why we weren't smart enough to invent it. Now we're impressed with all it lets us do, and wonder what it will be offering next.

Crunching some numbers from the Wikipedia page linked above—

- Of the 19 pre-Google (1993–1998), engines, 11 (58%) are still active.
- Of the 47 post-Google (1998–2012) engines, 27 (57%) are still active
- Just as the pre/post-Google SE survival rate has been consistent (57–58%), the


