May Musings from Your President by Brad Youngman

As some of you know I am having some back problems. This caused me to do an inventory of what I carry in a backpack devoted to computer diagnosis and repair. I have it spread out before me on the dining room table so that I might reduce its weight. I thought that some of you might be interested in what I see.

1. **Samsung NC10 netbook.** This runs Linux Mint 13 Mate, but not well. It gets bothersome screen flickers. Perhaps a clean installation of LM13 would fix the problem, or maybe I need a lighter version of LM. The 3 pound 11 once Samsung has been replaced by a
2. **Nexus 7 inch Android tablet,** which is much lighter. I like this thing. It was given to me after a bout in Stanford Hospital by my son and stepson. It does almost all of what I need in a portable device. Its screen size is acceptable and the onscreen keyboard is OK.

My wife bought me a **Bluetooth Logitech Keyboard for Android 3.0+ keyboard** for easy table setup. This keyboard is almost exactly the same size as the laptop keyboard upon which I compose these Musings. The only thing that it lacks is the number keypad, but this keeps it short. The hard case for the keyboard unfolds into a stand for the tablet. The 7-inch tablet looks a bit small for the stand, but a

10-inch tablet would fit perfectly. I carried the keyboard in the backpack until I found that I didn't have room for it on the Computer Lab workbench. It is a nice keyboard. Nice feel. Not flimsy. The Nexus 7 is protected by a **Miracase padded case** which has a zipper pocket for a

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couple of styluses, a pen and pencil set and some tiny earphones.

3. Some small laptops don't have CD/DVD drives, so I carry an **External Samsung DVD Writer Model SE-S084**. This USB device is handy. I got it originally to install software (read Linux) onto the Samsung netbook. I use it now to boot anti-malware disks on misbehaving computers that lack drives. More on those disks later.
4. Sometimes I want to install an operating system on a bare computer. The computer needs to connect to the web somehow. Since I usually have no drivers for the computer and don't want to start an agonizing search on the web (with another computer) for drivers, I carry an **Ethernet-to-USB adapter**. These devices come with a miniature disk with drivers for Windows, Mac, and Linux.

As time passes the driver disk becomes outdated. The manufacturers of these things don't provide updates on the web forever, so I get to buy a new one every few years or so. The one I bought in early April 2014 is a Wiretek 2-in-1, advertised as a "Free Drive for Ultrabook." It is a combined USB-to-Ethernet adapter with separately attachable 3-port USB hub. Cute, and the driver disk did the job. An-

other opportunity to spend \$19.95 at Central Computers.

5. I occasionally find the **Master NSIk-468 Cable Tester** useful. It is a continuity tester and has ports for Ethernet and telephone cables. It came with a black zipper case.
6. Sometimes I cannot tell if the motherboard or the power supply is bad. The **Antec Digital Power Tester** comes with connections for all of the cables that emerge from a power supply. You must connect the 4-pin and 20- or 24-pin cables (voltages will be shown) and then the other cables one by one. Wonderful device – about \$35. **You provide your own case for it. I found a Case Logic that fit it well.**
7. Sometimes people bring in camera chips. To read them I use a **Central Computers 35-in-1 Card Reader/Writer**. Dirt cheap and no case. I use a zip lock bag to house it.
8. I sometimes want to connect bare hard drives (of all types) to a computer for pulling data or diagnosing drive problems. The **Vantec CB-ISATAU2 SATA/IDE-to-USB 2.0 Adapter** does the job. I see that USB3 versions are available for similar devices. Once again the trusty zip lock bag keeps everything together.

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9. An **Extech Pocket Multimeter DV110** gives me a way to test the 2032 battery on a motherboard.

If the date and time must be reset frequently, the 2032 is most likely the problem.

When replacing the battery, have the new one ready, pull the old one and replace it quickly. This battery is for protecting data on the motherboard. If the battery is gone for “a long time”, the data will be lost and your computer will not run properly. It will have forgotten all about its component parts.

10. I have a couple of **Westars Wi-Fi USB dongles and a driver disk**. Sometimes they work, and sometimes not. The drivers must be out of date, and I haven’t found replacements on the web. The Ethernet-to-USB adapter is a more reliable way to connect to the internet.
11. I sometimes forget to charge my Android phone or the Nexus mentioned above. I have an **Anker 10000 mAh, 3.7 V, 37 Wh External Battery**. It works OK, but the wall chargers are quicker.
12. I carry **vga-to-dvi display cord adapters**. The dvi plug has two types. One has 4 more pins group than the other. I need both. The 4 extra pins are analog. I hear that you can break these off, but I’m cautious.
13. I carry **two screwdriver sets**.

One is an **ifixit (www.ifixit.com) 54 Piece Bit Driver Kit**. This is complete overkill offered by Maker Shed.

The other tool is a **Victorinox pocket knife with a screwdriver with 8 interchangeable tips**. It is advertised as a

computer repair tool but has a corkscrew. I don’t have room for a bottle of wine in my backpack.

14. I have **two flashlights, both LED**.

One is a cheapie from Orchard Supply that has a completely reliable push button switch.

The other is an expensively machined dual-brightness flashlight with lithium battery. Totally unreliable push button switch. Sure is pretty, though!

15. People ask me what kind of computer to buy. If I tell them to buy a Swifty Model XYZ I will then owe them service on a computer forever. If it is a dud, I’m screwed. So I point people to the **June Consumer Reports magazine and the June Electronics Buying Guide**. I carry the most recent versions in my bag. I will suggest • the Microsoft Store, because the computers they sell lack bloatware, and • Costco, because their warranty period is long and they take things back with no argument. I don’t know anything about other stores and make no recommendations.
16. **Disks**. I carry a bunch of them in zipper cases. The ones that I use most are:
- Linux Mint 13 Mate (32 and 64 bit)**. These are used for installation, Windows machine diagnostics, hard drive diagnostics, password reset, and data transfer. **Linux Mint 13 XFCE is for resource pinched machines**.
 - Darik’s Boot and Nuke (DBAN)**. Completely wipes hard drives.
 - Anti-Malware boot disks**: AVG, Avira, Avast, Bit Defender, Kasperski, Kasperski TDSS Killer (an .exe disk),

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- d. **Repair Disks:** Windows 7 (32 and 64 bit) and Vista (32 and 64 bit).

This is most of what I carry. I have 10 or 15 more disks for which I have forgotten the purpose. But there is really nothing to delete that makes much weight difference. I did take the opportunity to remove the various XP SP disks. I'm glad that we are on the way to being done with XP.

One of the volunteers points out that all of the disks that I use could be put on USB sticks. But I can't write small enough to mark each one with its contents. Wouldn't it be nice if USB sticks had small screens?

CROSS TALK:

- Maury Green began the discussion with **Open ssl: secure socket layer.**

“HeartBleed” hole in ssl will be significant. You may be hearing from your bank regarding changing your password. Avoid doing money transactions over the internet until you hear from your bank. Not necessary to change your passwords unless your service provider suggest you do. Android phones are susceptible to this security hole. Wait to hear from your service provider.

Brad Youngman cautioned meeting attendees that your bank will not phone you and tell you to phone a number for the banks fraud department.

- Brad Youngman talked about **“web of trust” (WOT)** at Sunnyvale Senior Center. It is a source for SSC members, similar to Yelp, of trusted internet sites.
- Larry Lutzker asked about **HTTPS. Is it secure?** Perhaps
- Chuck Schmidt posed a **question about XP. He wanted to run a scan but got an error message from Microsoft.** AVAST may still work.
- **XP may be put into a virtual machine.** For security reason you may not want to go out on the internet with XP.
- Peter Tobias wanted to know of **comparisons with Security Essentials vs Defender.** Screens look identical.
- Brad Youngman encouraged members it was **time to move on from XP. Windows8.1 is an okay product as is Windows7.**
- Les Spring asked **what to do with Microsoft Office2003.** Brad Youngman suggest LinuxMint and LibreOffice.
- Nat Landes mentioned he has several programs that he will continue to run on XP. He recommended members just take that computer off the net. Run all other programs, that need to go out onto the net, on Windows7 or Windows8.1.

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- Glen Murray reported he set up XP last week on a new computer. He feels this worry about XP is laughable. Similar in nature to the Y2k scare 14 years ago.
