Even if you use the patch to Microsoft's Outlook Express, you will have a cleanup task on your machine if you get the virus—which is where the real damage occurs. At the place where I teach, we have just abandoned Outlook Express in favor of Netscape—it was just faster and easier; we also think that the control features are more mature.

Often problems are brought to the Club for diagnosis but the description is without any screen dumps to show the situation. For clarity, while there are programs to make screen dumps, you can easily make one on ANY machine by:

- 1. Press PRINT SCRN. (Nothing seems to happen.)
- 2. Go to START | RUN and type WORDPAD. (Wordpad will show up.)
- 3. Hold CTRL and press V or click EDIT | PASTE (The captured view appears.)
- 4. Print the result normally.
- 5. Select where you were at the bottom of the screen.

Your assignment is to bring a copy of ANY printscreen to the meeting.

Su Hong Eatery, (for Optional dinner) El Camino Way at West Meadow Palo Alto

If you're on El Camino Real (ECR): Starting at Charleston, head north on ECR (toward Stanford U) in the far right lane. At the traffic signal a few hundred feet north of Charleston, take the 30degree right which turn puts you on El Camino Way, a narrow, two-way street. Su Hong is immediately to your right at the stop sign for the W. Meadow intersection, across from the Goodwill store.

If you're on W. Meadow: Drive toward the peninsula hills. W. Meadow ends at El Camino Way. Su Hong will be on your left. Parking may be tight in Su Hong's lot; you may have to park on the street.

Elks Lodge, 4249 El Camino Real, Palo Alto, CA 94306-4496

The Elks Lodge is on the bay side of the street, between Charleston and San Antonio Road, but very close to Charleston. It is next to Ricky's Hyatt House, which is on the corner.

Print Screen is created on one PC, proofed on a second, and produced for print on a third, by three different people, miles apart, using different versions of the same software, and different printers. You've just gotta know that provides an opportunity for glitches, gremlins, and all sorts of other problems. One of the problems you may have noticed is that some articles seem to end before they should. We're trying to keep that from happening. Jim Dinkey (the proofreader in this endeavor) suggested putting some sort of symbol at the end of an article; a parity bit as it were. Searching my available fonts for suitable characters, I found the two hands you should notice throughout this issue. I use the $\overset{\text{\tiny{(1)}}}{=}$ to indicate the end of an article and frame, and the *T* to indicate the end of material in a frame, although the reader is expected to continue elsewhere.

Outlook Express message-handling rules

Outlook Express allows you to block messages from specified senders or to specify other messagehandling rules.

I've just received a message from a sender I don't know. Judging from the title of the message, I don't even want to read it. I don't want to ask the sender to stop, because that can result in me getting more messages, possibly from other senders. So that I don't have to read additional mail from this sender, I selected the message, then clicked "Message/**Block Sender** .../OK", starting at the menu bar. Until I change my Blocked Senders List, messages from this undesired sender will be sent, unread, directly to my Deleted Items area. To edit my Blocked Senders List, I click "Tools/ Message Rules/Blocked Senders List", starting at the **main** Outlook Express menu bar. Then I can edit the list.

Outlook Express also lets you create and edit other message-handling rules. As with blocking messages from a specified sender, you start by clicking Message as described above. Similarly, to edit or delete a rule, you start by clicking Tools as described above. For more information about blocking a sender or creating a rule for some other situation, use Outlook Express Help.

There are two address lists available for e-mailing to SPAUG members. One is spaug-list, used for general mailings to all members. The other is a listing of individual member addresses. Both lists are available from our website's left-column "Whom to contact" link. On the first page, below the listing of officers and other mukimuks, click on the link to members' e-mail addresses. Be aware that if you use spaug-list to send a message, any address error problem will be reported to SPAUG's webmaster, but not to you as the sender. Every so often you should check these lists, to be sure your SPAUG e-mail addresses are correct.

To check your spaug-list address:

1. If your e-mail has a signature file, either turn it off, or put the command

End

after your Majordomo commands. Otherwise, you will receive an error message concerning the "not recognized" words in the signature file

2. Send the message

who spaug-list end

To: majordomo@lists.ispchannel.com

and leave the Subject line blank.

If you send your message from an address that is on the list, you will receive a reply containing all the addresses on the list. Otherwise, your request will be rejected.

To check your individual (non **spaug-list**) address:

Below the spaug-list link are the names of individual members. If your name is on this list, check to be sure it's linked to an e-mail address you're currently using. Right-click on your name, then select "Properties". If the "mail to:" address shown at the bottom of the window is not correct, please send the correct info to the SPAUG webmaster, whose address is available at several places on the page and on the site. If you have e-mail capability and your name is not on the list, please consider adding it.

To add, change, or delete your e-mail address on either list, send a message to SPAUG's webmaster.
