Notes from the Prez by Jim Dinkey

25th Anniversary

With this 25th Anniversary Reunion Dinner, we acknowledge that the prior leadership had not only the foresight to recognize that there was a need for a formalized structure but also that they had the management skills to bring about the original SPAUG organization.

While I have been President for about 8 years, I have merely continued with the general format of my predecessors. They figured out a formula that worked and applied it consistently.

They are to be congratulated for their foresight and perseverance. We honor them with the November dinner and meeting.

But the fundamental problems with computers nave not changed. Here we are a quarter of a century later and we are still having to contend with many of the same old problems: the requirement for lots of training to operate the computer, the cleaning up of the computer itself and because of the Internet, a new problem of protecting the computer from the problems induced by the creation and use of the Internet – a win/lose proposition.

<u>Clinic</u>

That having been said, the Clinic has been in existence since the beginning of SPAUG but it was not until recently there was a fixed place for sick computers to be made well.

And, yes, the complexity hasn't been getting better—the complexity and knowledge set required to fix the computers of this world is now totally daunting for the new or inexperienced user.

In order to extend the time before you have to bring your computer to a professional, here is a procedure that will help you delay that event:

PREPARE FOR DOING a backup:

- Go to MY COMPUTER and right-click the disk PROPERTIES and execute DISK CLEANUP.
- Move over to the TOOLS tab and check out the integrity of the hard drive. Only about 1 percent show a problem here, but if it does, nothing else will go right for the day.

- If anything appears improper, bite the bullet and do a disk check again with both boxes checked. This will require a reboot and then the Microsoft diagnostics will be able to fix bad spots, missing chains, and orphaned information.. Plan on an hour for this task. Review the diagnostic progress frequently to establish what type of errors are presented and determine if the disk is salvageable.
- Then do the DEFRAG in a lower panel. Plan that 35,000 fragments will take 4 hours and proportionally less for 'normal' fragmentation.
- Now that the data is known good, by whatever means you have at your disposal, protect yourself and your client by doing a backup. Install backup software if necessary and use USB external drives if necessary although an internal second drive install is the preferred method. If this step is requested to be skipped, hand him back the computer—you are too vulnerable.
- Bring all patches current including Office installations.

The next step is to get rid of the chaff to lessen the level of loading of the tables on the computer.

- Run CCLEANER to get rid of the yearsold log files and other junk. Leave cookies alone for now.
- Run a registry cleaner to assure that removed programs are not lingering.
- Run SPACEMONGER to just look at the data on the disk and to look for anomalies that don't need to be there. Seeing where and how big all of the files are, quite often

will allow you to delete many gigabytes of junk.

- If you can get Internet connection, run HijackThis to identify if there are infections on the computer. The SPAUG CD discusses the rather complex procedure in fine additional detail to assist you with this step.
- If any anomalies show up, start running anti-virus diagnostics provided by the malware companies such as Trend Micro's Housecall and equivalent programs by Kaspersky, Symantec, AVG, Avast!, Microsoft, Panda and McAfee. Run lots as the mix that each one gets is often not the same and one will work in a given situation where others will not. The pattern is never the same. Allow hours.
- Now that the computer is clean, check that the hardware is being reported as clean in the CONTROL PANEL, SYS-TEM, HARDWARE, and DEVICE MANAGER panel. Fix any anomalies.

Up until now, the interaction with the owner is not very critical because the basic integrity of the computer is being restored and checked as getting control of the computer is paramount. You can't go forward to new stuff until the computer works with what it already has.

Now it is time to address the customer complaint which is often: "It is slow!"

Slowness is often a proliferation of spyware and adware. There are many ways to handle a slowness problem but to merely make a first pass without shelling out money for a single pass, the venerable Spybot and AdAware are good enough but in the long run, a better set

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of paid programs needs to be installed to stop the junk from getting onto the computer in the first place.

Crashing is entirely another problem and much more disruptive. Possibly the most effective remedy here is to reinstall SP2 as it will, with is patches, restore a non-functioning computer's structure to factory integrity. Plan that the maneuver will again require some after-market software to be reinstalled. Do an incremental backup after the SP2 reinstall just to capture the status of your work. Some personalizations will be lost. Clients will become impatient with the fact that you are not working on "their" problem while assuring that the underlying computer is ready to go. If SP2 doesn't fix the problems, then you have your backup and so you are in position to do a reload.

Install and demonstrate the use of ERUNT which will capture the registry and can be used to back out a virus when encountered.

Make sure the firewall is set up properly by visiting the Gibson site to set up the firewall and then dynamically test it using some of Gibson's tools.

And finally, listening to the customer about what he/she would like to have the computer do for him/her, the computer can be customized for the user needs. Adding Print-Key2000 (on the SPAUG CD) is a very popular addition as then the user can not only keep screen shots of problems but also he/she can then do a lot of printing without the usual hassle of setting up every little part of the process.

Other than that we don't do much in the Clinic other than return the computer working. Trivial.

- There is a wireless signal provided by the American Legion Post meeting place, so the club computer and guests can connect to the Internet.
- No coffee is available currently at our General Meetings—a volunteer could provide it, if someone steps up. We don't have kitchen privileges, that would be an extra \$15/month, and we probably don't need it. There are cookies available, thanks to Joan Wheelwright. We could use a Program Director, and back-ups for all positions.

CrossTalk/Random Access

- Problem: A computer boots randomly, and sometimes doesn't boot. It isn't a heat issue. Suggestions:
- leave it on with diagnostics running, and hope the diagnostics catch the problem;
- also, check log files;

- check power supply, memory, etc. any of which could be the problem.
- There is a diagnostic program available; \$70-\$80 will buy one (email Jim Dinkey for a name, if you need more help choosing one).
- Swap out memory, or run a memory checker—memcheck <http://www.soft32. com/download_7869.html> is a good one to run, and is on some previous club CDs.
- Problem: After vacation, computer does not stay on. Eventually after many tries it booted, but icons were scrambled and disappeared.

Answer: It may be a capacitor, or a power supply issue, or a fan problem (some newer hardware won't boot if fans aren't working). You may need a trip to Hank Skawinski, or perhaps the clinic.

- Problem: Microsoft patches failed to install - all eight. None were installed. Answer: Recent patches are important; and should be installed. Keep trying to install them, after a few days. Microsoft provides free support for patches that go wrong—call them for help.
- dslreports.com <http://www.dslreports. com/> and mycooltools <http://www. mycooltools.com/> are good sites to find out about ISPs and test your connection.
- Problem: my antivirus is expiring what should I get?
 Answer: For expired antivirus, PC-Cillin 2006 is a good AV; \$20-25 through eBay. It comes with three licesnes. Or NOD32 is good.

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<u>Presentation</u>

The entire presentation is available online as an MP3 file ("podcast"). It can be opened in iTunes, Windows Media Player, Audacity, or other application to play audio MP3 files.

Gene Barlow of UGR gave a presentation on the *"Top 10 Ways to Protect your PC"*. Least-important to-most important.

- Stay current with technology. Replace hardware every 4-5 years, and get new OS at the same time. Consider cost/ benefit of upgrading applications, but don't feel obliged until it's a definite improvement.
- Organize the hard drive. Put data into a separate partition. This is safer, easier to back up, and accessible if you use dual boot into other Operating Systems. *Disk Director Suite 10* is current, and a good buy—it also runs in Vista. You want a separate partition for each OS, and inactive OS partitions should be hidden to prevent cross-corruption. A separate drive (internal or external) would be used for back up.
- Run in a "Sandbox" for Risky Tasks. This is especially advisable for browsing the Internet, testing new software, opening unfamiliar email, giving others access to your computer. *True Image 11* Try&Decide feature is a sandbox—you decide to keep all or delete all changes that were made (it may not operate in Vista).
- Wipe hard drive before getting rid of old computer. Deleting files and formatting are not sufficient, nor is defragmenting.
- Encrypt private information. *My Security Vault* does that for \$15.

- **Beware of Spam.** Some are dangerous, with bad attachments, links, images, phishing, etc.
- Install security patches. You might want to wait a few days to see if any other early adopters had problems, but some patches are for "zero day" exploits, and you are at immediate risk. Don't wait too long.
- **Internet security:** firewall, antivirus, antispyware, antimalware. These may be individual applications, or part of a suite; but protection against all hazards is essential. A good root kit detector and remover is also a good idea.
- Get professional help if needed. Let someone else deal with the complexity of modern computers, so you get hassle-free computing. *Invisus iClean Service* will do this. It performs many functions, remotely over the Internet. It's \$29.99 for the service, and it's real people doing the servicing. They provide ongoing support for \$9.99/month after the initial month. Invisus iSafe Service is a step up, but includes a suite of security software. Checkup is \$49.99 and 14.99/month. Top of the line is Invisus iCare Service, \$99.99 initial, \$29.99/month.
- Have a recent full backup. Acronis *True Image 11 Home* http://www.ugr.com/TrueImage.html is the answer to this. Recommended by SPAUG, and good reviews everywhere.

The Hall is paid through March; Jim Dinkey will check with the PA Elks Lodge and see if we're current or overpaid; Nat will let Jim know the status of our account with the Elks Lodge.

- **PrintScreen**—John Buck—we're currently filling the basic one ounce mailing rate with the current Print Screen newsletter.
- General Meeting Setup/Cleanup support—October meeting setup and take down were good.


For November, we'll have to set up as well as take down. Jim Dinkey will need help setting up, carrying in equipment from the car, since the CompuSIR group will not precede us.
