Hank Skawinski's Recommended MALWARE REMOVAL TOOLS and PROGRAMS

NOTE: Editor John Buck has added Snapfiles, com and Amazon. com links for more info about these and similar programs. Most other comments are from Jim Dinkey.

ERUNT and ERDNT – Windows Registry Backup and Restore Program Pair

- ► Use ERUNT to save your registry contents.
- ▶ Use ERDNT to restore the registry, from a file previously created via ERUNT. A message from ERUNT tells how to do this.

Malware can only exist within the registry. Having a backup copy of your registry without infection gives you a source for replacing the contents of a corrupted registry with those from an earlier time. Since malware likes to hide, the trick for you is to decide when the malware arrived and to restore your registry to a time before then. The restoration effectively removes the malware's links from the registry.

Because ERUNT-generated files are in the 30 MB range, you probably don't want to clutter up your

system with too many of them—I recommend making registry backups weekly, and keeping only the three latest versions.

UNLOCKER – File unlocking program.

UNLOCKER allows you to delete a file even though it is hidden, entrenched into the operating system with the intention that it will never be deleted. Many system files have this characteristic, as do many malware programs.

It is not unusual for an anti-malware program to report a malware file that it cannot delete, leaving the final removal to you. When you have a file of this nature, you will know that it is time to use UNLOCKER. Until then, merely keep UNLOCKER handy.

AUTORUNS – Utility to control startup programs in Windows

<u>WARNING:</u> AUTORUNS allows you to set parameters on many control functions within the Microsoft internals. Unless you know what you are doing or have been directed by a set of instructions from an expert, it is best to just forget you have this program on hand. Let the professionals work with it.

MSCONFIG -- Utility to control startup programs in Windows

- Already included in Windows

MSCONFIG lets you select what programs are started at boot time. If, at boot time, ALL programs are started, the computer will immediately fill all of RAM with programs competing for resources, and will have to use lots of resources to swap out what is not needed when the items required are called for.

It is quite acceptable to turn off ALL programs and force Windows to start up only what is required. A better middle ground is to start up only those programs you know you are going to need and to cause those programs not immediately needed or only possibly needed, to remain quiescent until needed. Rebooting takes less time this way and the thrashing of the operating system shuffling programs out of available memory is much less apparent. Here's the good news—you won't hurt your computer even if you clear ALL the checkmarks; the list will be repopulated as needed at the next boot.

CCLEANER – Currently the best and safest Windows-cleaning program

CCLEANER—"Crap Cleaner" if you will, "knows" where all of the junk is on your computer and removes it for you. It is not unusual to remove a full gigabyte of excess and obsolete files from a well-used computer.

CCLEANER's default settings as installed allow it to select and present items you probably shouldn't delete. The November 2010 SPAUG newsletter shows you how to best set up CCLEANER. Running CCLEANER weekly is a good idea—your computer will be running faster.

Also, use CCLEANER's second icon ("Registry") to clean the registry. Do it monthly. DO NOT USE OTHER REGISTRY CLEANERS, as they are either junk or malware.

SNOWBIRD FILE MANAGER – A substitute for Windows Explorer when infected.

SNOWBIRD FILE MANAGER is essentially impervious to being affected by malware and is needed when dealing with malware that is able to resist other file managers.

MALWAREBYTES can scan a computer for Malware. Malwarebytes can be installed without a reboot. This is why Microsoft support personnel who are assisting users to remove malware, all use Malwarebytes.

For a one-time charge of \$25 for a license in <u>perpetuity</u>, the program's realtime protection, scheduled scanning, and scheduled updating capabilities can be unlocked and used. Get rid of all other antivirus programs. Malwarebytes paid version will update itself five to seven times a day.

SUPERANTISPYWARE – Another fantastic malicious software removal program

SUPERANTISPYWARE seems to be obsessively concerned with cookies. It does, however, at least identify them, unlike most of the competition. Does inadequate identification of severity, but does at least report the percentage of malicious cookies that are malicious.

AVIRA ANTIVIR – Best free antivirus program

AVIRA ANTIVIR has a proven track record at being effective and well maintained. It seems to cause little speed reduction. While it is free, the paid version is also worthwhile.

FIREFOX Web Browser – Best, most flexible, and safest web browser; with many Add-On functions to greatly improve safety

FIREFOX—In view of the fact that 95% of malware that gets onto your computer comes from Internet Explorer, it is best to use Firefox exclusively except for Windows Update. Have someone set up the initial criteria for you of what sites are to be blocked or evaluated.

ACRONIS TRUE IMAGE is used when the computer needs to be reloaded in order to get rid of malware or when the hard drive has gone away. After proper verification, Acronis never misses a restore, and the restore is complete. There are many schemes available to permit various unattended backups to be performed—such as Incremental and Daily Full. This program should be used on all computers.
