Computer support is available at:

XP or Windows 7?

ing was to start last month, I may well begin to be more amenable to getting a laptop with Windows 7 and then immediately **also** put on Windows XP. Whether I put the two operating systems as boot options or run one of them in simulator mode is yet to be determined. For practice I may do both.

If you want XP and can't get it at the local store, you can always get one on the net. Often they are licenses that were bought long ago and were not used.

Spoofed or Forged Emails



I try to be very cautious about what I allow onto my computer. Recently, during a brief period of time, I received emails from some

people I know, but with content that that made me suspect these messages were spoofs or forgeries, and not from the purported senders.

Doing some follow-up checking, I determined that the purported senders' email passwords had been hacked/cracked because they were short and/or easily guessable.



Although it is impossible to make your email address absolutely immune to spoofing or forging, you can easily reduce your vulnerabil-

ity to this scourge by using an email password that • is long (14-to-16 characters), • contains some numbers, and also • has some capital letters. Try, also, to make it something you can remember without writing it down, but not something that could be easily guessed or cracked. Something like:

E55PeaEhYew6ee

(derived from the letters S P A U G, and 14 characters long)

Password cracking routines can grab passwords in bulk in encrypted mode and work on a batch of them until enough fall out as cracked passwords. These passwords are then used to send out email in your name. Longer passwords don't get cracked so easily, so they are less attractive to spammers, who want the quickest possible results from their efforts.

Getting a Speedy Internet



How to get high-speed Internet is always an interesting moving target.

I can report that my personal experience with Comcast was just plainly a fraud. All of their advertising and written materials and personnel were using the figure 12 Mb/second. I have heard of some people getting bursts of that. My actual experience was that I NEVER saw anything above 2.6 Mb/second. I wasn't sorry to see Comcast go.



A supplier that seems to have pretty good chances of delivering a consistently decent speed is **Hughes Satellite.** Clearly this is

probably the supplier of choice if you are in the middle of the Iowa corn belt. The Hughes satellite service just might be a possibility if you are too far away from a fiber optic delivery point for DSL services. Thus Hughes can handle your own private electronic corn belt.


