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Notes from the Prez

One function of SPAUG is to provide you the opportunity to improve your computer use and maintenance capabilities.

Toward that end we provide:

- A newsletter, which can provide insights into how to maintain your computer:
- A tutorial meeting at which you are provided with the knowledge of how to use some tools
- Speakers giving breadth to many technical discussions.
- The Clinic to help fill in with the correction of the computer to a normal standard.

If you are using Microsoft Windows 7...

... you have the opportunity of a lifetime to decide which backup program you want/need to use —whether it will be Acronis or the built-in Backup offered by Microsoft. Both are effective and

both work. Microsoft's is included in your purchase price.

The choice is not as simple as you might think—that the free one is the proper choice by default, as free is always better. Possibly so.

The Microsoft Way for Windows 7

Microsoft Windows 7 SYSTEM IMAGING APPLETT makes a full backup of the system portion of your computer. It makes only one, under the philosophy that the Computer System Files change very slowly.

Then there is the User Data Backup (a full backup) followed by a series of incremental backups of the data to a particular limit. These sets continue until 6 months have passed, at which time the oldest sets are deleted.

By separating the backups into SYSTEM backup and DATA backup, the total amount of backup file space is minimized while retaining full integrity.

If you choose to go this way, you <u>must</u> create your own Win 7 bootable System Recovery Disk to allow you to recover your data in case of hard drive failure or data corruption.

Before you start any backup using the procedure above, be sure to have available some detailed instructions covering the entire project in the prompts. If you don't want the hassle of the initial setup, have the SPAUG Clinic help you with the project. Works only for Microsoft Windows 7.

The Acronis Way for Windows 7

For \$25 per computer, you can have Acronis True Image Home 2011 [aka here as "Acronis"] from Gene Barlow's ugr.com, which has a different approach to identifying exactly what you need as a total solution.

Works for all Windows versions.

Essentially, Acronis makes a full backup (system and data), and then (about) 6 incremental backups, and then starts all over again with another full backup. When the repeating cycle gets to a predetermined space limit, the oldest set of backups is deleted, especially if over 6 months old.

Comparison

Both backup techniques (Microsoft's and Acronis) work, but Acronis gives you a little more control over the process. It is, however, critically dependent on Gene Barlow's Starter Guide from his UGR.COM website, via http://tinyurl.com/3hmaxnb.

One problem using Acronis is that the instructions on how to set up the above scheme are not very clear in the Acronis documentation. To handle this problem of poor documentation, Gene Barlow [owner of User Group Relations, <ugr.com>] has created a

pdf document [http://tinyurl.com/3hmaxnb] that clearly describes how to easily set up and use the repeating sequence of full and incremental backups. Gene's document suggests six incrementals to one base. I tend to change that figure to 10.

Using Acronis version 10 on my own computer, there is a scheduler, so I am doing the identical type of backup automatically with Acronis' built-in scheduler, except I let it run for 20 incrementals. When the target disk begins to get full, I manually delete 2 or 3 of the strings (sets of backups) to assure I'll have enough space on my 250 GB target drive, which is mounted inside my desktop computer. The 250 GB drive holds about 3 months of backups, representing six independent backup sets. Overkill, but I am happy with it. I have had to restore portions of the backed up material twice in six years.

<u>Comparison of MS' and Acronis' philosophies</u>

Microsoft Backup is <u>not</u> turned on by Microsoft's default, because Microsoft has no idea where you want to put your data. Once the Backup program is fed the information where the backup is to go, the process is totally automatic.

The same philosophy can be said for Acronis, except that Acronis makes a repeating series of full backups followed by a variable number of incremental backups for each full backup.

One common requirement is that you have to choose where the backup files are to be stored. One place NOT to store the files is in a partition on the physical same drive that is being backed up because when the physical drive fails, your backups go too!

My preferred solution is to install a second hard drive into a desktop computer—not only to avoid the inevitable physical abuse and jarring of an external drive, but it also allows the processes to run at three times the speed of an external USB 2.0 drive. The new, faster 3.0 USB interface will run at only the speed of the 2.0 USB interface that will continue until you buy a 3.0 equipped replacement computer.

If you are using a laptop, you don't have much choice: either a USB external or an internal net-oriented backup solution. If your situation includes some combination of desktop and laptop computers, installing a backup drive into a desktop can permit laptops to do their backup over an internal house-oriented network.

Defragmenting

Windows 7 has turned on, by default, the defragmenter.

Until now, Microsoft Windows products, starting with Windows 95, defragmenting was not automatic. I always thought this was a marketing error requiring users to have to either run the manual one included with the operating system or go out and buy a defragmenter such a **Perfect Disk** < http:// tinyurl.com/2vzpq5 >, which has a scheduler built into it. Since most users don't know how to spell defragmenter much less use it, making the defragmenter available by default is a masterstroke. I have to wonder why Microsoft chose 1 a.m. on Sunday morning as default. Changing the time of defragmenting to a daytime hour and running the defragmenter daily is almost a necessity, as many computers are not running at the default hour of 1 a.m.

Microsoft Updates, Windows XP and Windows 7

One of the most insidious and common errors XP users make when monthly updating their computers is to assume that turning on AUTOMATIC means that the computer is updated totally. What they often miss is that in XP and Windows 7, there is an update option called CUSTOM. CUSTOM must be checked monthly and downloads made under human control in both XP and Windows 7.



The story about capacitor problems, aka "Capacitor Plague"

Yeah, I know – you are not into electronics. But you need to be aware of this much. The story as I know it:

About ten years ago a Japanese firm was making capacitors that worked well. They were the envy of the industry. Their capacitors went into every thing electronic, including computers. All of its competitors envied the Japanese firm.

So some Taiwanese guys who were working at the Japanese firm stole the two components of the dielectric solution that went into each

capacitor to stop the capacitors from expanding, bulging, growing fat and leaking after five years.

The only problem was they didn't steal enough! There was a third agent, an antifoaming ingredient that has never been divulged. The thieves didn't know it existed!

So now, throughout the world, there are tons of capacitors that are going to fail in five years and the Taiwanese don't care because their warranty is 90 days and you are on your own after that. This means that a 15-cent part can fail 5 years later and someone has to remove the motherboard, unsolder the offending part, solder in a new part and then return the computer to the owner.

About the only suggestion I have is to buy Japanese motherboards!

These capacitors are in <u>everything</u>—not just computers. Clocks, TVs, autos, everything. And the position of the capacitor manufacturers is still "90-days"!

This explains the rationale of the U. S. procurement agencies that the materials all are made under their control to assure quality. Servicing satellites is an expensive proposition. The military has the same attitude of producing critical parts domestically, where they can be inspected for compliance.

future" at that time. The club laptop has just been upgraded to Windows 7.

The laptop was doing fine. The Microsoft upgrade diagnostic was run, and the result was that Windows 7 could likely run on it. So the SPAUG laptop is now running Windows 7 without any problems.

When did you last use a given program?

Belarc Advisor < http://www.snapfiles.com/get/belarc.html > can tell you the last time you ran a particular program (see screen capture on page 6). A program that has not been run in a year is a likely candidate for removal in order to reduce the amount of memory, space, resources and overhead from the computer. Remember, everything slows down with overhead!

Transferring large files?

Dropbox < http://www.snapfiles.com/get/dropbox.html > is a means of transferring large files to someone when the file is too large to be an email attachment. The technique is to go to the Dropbox site and create a free account (there is a 2 GB free limit) and then tell someone else where the files is and they can then transfer the file to their computer.


<u>Windows 7 almost five times more secure than XP</u>

Looking at the number of reported infections per 1,000 computers, Microsoft found that Windows 7 64-bit had the lowest number at 2.5, while the 32-bit version had 3.8.

Windows 64-bit offers a feature called Kernel Patch Protection, which protects

the Windows kernel from unauthorized changes.

Security holes in applications versus those in operating systems or Web browsers accounted for most of the vulnerabilities last year, according to Microsoft. However, the total number of holes found in applications fell 22.2 percent from 2009. But exploits that take advantage of Java vulnerabilities rose dramatically in last year's third quarter, surpassing every other category, the report noted.

This means that, in any one year, fewer than 4% (1 in 25) of computers will pick up a vi-

rus. This is not to mitigate the havoc that some viruses will initiate, but it is not a number that says you should panic. Mostly the solution is to dump the program that let the virus in (as it is missing the pattern) and install a replacement until the problem is solved. With scans running an hour or so, this is a time intensive task.


