Topic: The Search for Life in the Universe and Our Future

Speaker: Simon "Pete" Worden, PhD, Center Director, Ames Research Center

We've begun to identify places in our own and other solar systems that could, in principle, have liquid water on their surfaces. Another source of insight into our search for life comes from developments in the field of synthetic biology that suggest that we—and presumably extra terrestrial intelligence—could engineer life to exist in broader ranges of conditions than we find on earth. Dr. Worden will discuss these developments and their implications for our search for life.

Before becoming the center director at NASA Ames in 2006, Dr. Worden was a Professor at the University of Arizona where his primary

the requisite skills and who then proceeded to discover the required files and print them. They were also transferred to floppies to allow them to be uploaded onto a PC.


So I am all right now and have the files the CPA deemed desirable. In reality, the files were clearly marked and obvious as the prior user of the Apple had been an H & R Block Tax Consultant. She knew, generally, what was coming and made every effort to prepare!

What she did not do was prepare <u>me</u> at all because the disease was so pervasive that it was too late.

- Thanks to **Carl Moyer** for microphone service. It is great to have a mobile cordless mic, and amplified speaker. As recorder, I really appreciate it.
- A member upgraded a power supply, found out "capacitor rot" was reducing voltage to a point that problems were occurring. The new power supply fixed all the problems. If you add a lot of accessories to a desktop, be sure to verify you have enough power. If you are experiencing weird symptoms, check the power supply.
- The Sunnyvale Senior Center has a computer repair group, which is a resource available for \$32/year, even if you are not a Sunnyvale resident.

- A member wanted to buy a high-end Dell, took the specs to Central Computer. They gave him a selection of parts, which he assembled himself with great success. He is delighted with the results.

- If you Google-search for "bad capacitors" < http://tinyurl.com/ajjg4hu>, you can find an explanation. Some of the photos are an eyeful.

The problem resulted from Chinese copycats using the wrong formula for the capacitor electrolyte ingredients. Many computer manufacturers bought the bad capacitors and used them in their products. Even Dell, HP, Lenovo, Apple and others had, and continue to have, the problem.

Be sure your computer equipment (even power warts, routers and modems, TVs, etc.) has Japanese capacitors. If a product failure results in bulging or swelling capacitors it is a victim of a "bad capacitor". Get Business grade, not Consumer grade computers to reduce the likelihood of having a problem.

- Hank's 2009 netbook has been working like a champ. Small screen size is the only disadvantage.
- Hank got a 2011 Thunderbolt smartphone, but the capability is limited. The Jawbone Jambox < http://tinyurl.com/ b4rgc76>is a Bluetooth (wireless) speaker system. It also works with the netbook quite well. Is available at Costco, Amazon and other stores. Hank uses the phone to communicate with servers to get reports on backups, errors, etc.
- One common phenomenon Hank has seen recently is enterprises, schools, and clients buying iPhones and iPads. The versatility and capabilities are impressing everyone. The Apple products seem to be far more advanced than the competition. Win8 RT is inferior in several respects. The iPad Mini is becoming quite popular

due to its more convenient size (it will fit in a sport coat pocket or vest). Hank's wife is a teacher, and finds the iPad and Google Chromebook are popular with students. The Chromebook has the Google education app, which is a marvelous system.

 Ubiquitous Computing is approaching at a high rate. Computers are everywhere now: cars, airplanes, ships, TVs, DVD players, phones, in addition to computers of all size and description.

One problem is the amount of data people are accumulating; more and more storage is required. One solution is the Cloud; but there is a limit to size and bandwidth; plus if the Internet connection is missing, you are stranded.

**Privacy is an issue, too.** If it's valuable, you should have several local backups (such as external drives). It would be good to have at least one alternate email account, too, in case one is somehow lost.

 Android is a flavor of Linux, so the different manufacturers of Android devices have slightly different versions installed.

In contrast, Apple's iOS is consistent over most of its products, and often works (if not gracefully and seamlessly) with Microsoft OSs.

• Many offices are getting away from Microsoft Office products. They are using Google Docs < http://tinyurl.com/ar46sjl> or Open Source (e.g., OpenOffice.org). Microsoft sales are flattening and will decrease as the trend continues. This is a side effect of ubiquitous computing. Win8 will not catch on with businesses; people prefer Win7, or even WinXP. Or

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they will go iOS Apple products, or perhaps a Chromebook <a href="http://tinyurl.com/cjpab7q">http://tinyurl.com/cjpab7q</a> (for about \$250). Furthermore, upgrading from Office 2003 to 2010 is a real learning curve. This helps Google Docs popularity. Or people go to RTF format. Also, email is mostly plain text/HTML.

Microsoft is no longer a powerful monopoly. They lost money for the first time in 2012; their profit comes from MS Office. Due to the increasing competition, this profit center is becoming less. For example, Family Tree Maker links to Ancestry.com; eventually FTM will be phased out, and direct access to Ancestry.com will be the new paradigm.

- You can still load Linux on a Dell Win7
  machine; but you cannot do that in
  Win8. The new BIOS restricts any
  change. A Win7 download from TechNet
  can be loaded almost anywhere.
- The Oracle VM <a href="http://tinyurl.com/azenjfg">http://tinyurl.com/azenjfg</a> box can be used to run several different operating systems.
   You will need a powerful machine to virtualize and run applications.

You still need to install the OS and applications for each virtual OS, but one installation can be copied any number of times; it's better to use identical or very similar hardware to avoid driver conflicts; or uninstall and reinstall the proper driver.

Also, drastic changes may cause the OS to require reinstallation, or even fail to boot.

### **Q/A SESSION**

• Caution: **do not do the Win8 installa- tion.** Walt Mossberg's review <a href="http://tinyurl.com/alh8cmp">http://tinyurl.com/alh8cmp</a> of the *Wall Street Journal* cautions against it. You need a

touchscreen for best results. He says, "But, if you don't, or can't [get Windows 8 via an all-new PC], and have even a three-year-old PC, you may want to just stick with the Windows you've got."

If you want Win8, buy a Win8 machine—but try it first, you may not like the new interface. 40% of businesses are still using WinXP; Win7 seems a good replacement; infections still affect Win7, but its security is considerably better.

• 10% of the World's computers are running Ubuntu Linux <a href="http://www.ubuntu.com/">http://www.ubuntu.com/</a>. Mainly computers whose users cannot afford Windows. Hank recommends everyone get Ubuntu's latest version <a href="http://www.ubuntu.com/download">http://www.ubuntu.com/download</a>. If you must have Win7, go online and search. Don't go Win8. Touchscreens have their place, but not on a Desktop, or in an office environment.

# My Opinion on Windows 8 by Robert Mitchell (edited for use here)

I have read about Microsoft's Windows 8 operating system and have had a chance to play with it. From my little experience with it, it's cool and neat having those live tiles, and is a huge change from Windows 7 and previous versions of Windows.

Windows 8 is Microsoft's answer to Apple's IOS operating system for Phones and tablets. The trend is moving toward touch interfaces, found everywhere from phones to order terminals in restaurants. Microsoft developed Win 8 for phones, tablets and regular computers with touch interface.

For playing with small devices such as tablets and phones, Win 8 makes sense, but for regular computers, I find it more difficult than a mouse, because my the arm and hand get tired from being held in the air for a long time. Other than that, Win 8 does have potential in some areas such as tablets and phones. Writing a 500-page book would be awkward using a touch screen keyboard and no mouse. This would be true for many applications where a regular computer, mouse and keyboard are still needed.

The RT version of the Surface tablet has limited uses in my opinion, because it can't run regular Windows software. The price of \$500 to \$800 depending on the version is too much money.

Hank Skawinski thinks Windows 8 is going to fail for Microsoft. He says that Microsoft is already showing signs of failure in some areas. All new computers have Windows 8, so it's best to find last year's models on sale to get Windows 7.

I heard from others, both Hank and someone at last SVCS meeting Monday night [Jan 14, 2013], that the Win 8 computers will not run Windows 7 due to locking features in BIOS of the machine. This is another disturbing trend for forcing users to use the new version. What the manufacturer thinks is right is not always the right choice for the customer. Forcing it into the users' hands is the way they get their way.

For a Tablet, I will stick with my Apple iPad, since the interface is clean, neat and is easy to use. I'll stick with Windows for my computer and MAC OS 10.7 for my Apple Macintosh.

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### Wrestling With Windows 8: a Woman's Perspective by Louise Trevelyan-Luhmert, a friend of Editor John Buck (edited for use here)

First off, here's a bit of humour that describes my experience: Windows versus Ford <a href="http://tinyurl.com/avt88ys">http://tinyurl.com/avt88ys</a>.

If you are thinking of upgrading to Windows 8 you might want to have second thoughts if you have older equipment like printers, scanners or other programs running that you like and still work for you like a charm. I am not hearing much good about Windows 8, but that is all that is available now.

My 13-year-old computer with Windows XP Professional was ready to pack it in and there were some things from more updated friends that I couldn't get into or read, thus the need to upgrade. I don't know why they can't make the new programs compatible with the older ones. Talk about wasting money. browsing I came across a new app that said something to the effect of "Wizard download" so I tried it and it was for my printer so I followed through the instructions and now I have my printer working to print from my computer and scan to my computer which is all I really need anyway.

This Windows 8 will absolutely not accept my flat scanner, which is also 13 years old and works like a charm, and I really liked it and used it all the time. It isn't accepted at all, and when I looked the product up on the internet it said there was nothing that could be done as the program, if it could be downloaded, may damage Windows 8.
