Filler by John Buck SCROLLING SCREEN CAPTURE

There are many good Screen Capture programs out there. I have several on my machine, each of which offers a slightly different set of capabilities, including ease of use. A major criterion I have been using for several years now to decide whether to further investigate a screen capture program is "does it support capture of a scrolling screen?". Additional considerations are:

- Does it do horizontal scrolling?
- Does it do both horizontal and vertical scrolling on the same page (where the page is both wider and taller than my program is displaying)?
- How universal is it? Some scrollingprograms will work only with specific browsers or other programs; until now, I haven't found one that works with Opera, my preferred browser.

I have recently found a program—Duck Link's **Duck Capture**—http:// www.ducklink.com/ (not to be confused with the DuckDuckGo search engine) that will scroll-capture Opera windows.

Other screen-capture programs I use are: **Faststone Capture, XnView,** and **Picpick.**

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CONVERTING PDF FILES TO WORD

Round 1—a single-page file In late April 2013, I received an urgent email from a friend, asking for help converting some online pdf files to Word, so she could some editing. One file was a single page; the other was 32 pages, of which she wanted page 28.

The easy part was downloading the files, then the fun began. My first observation was that the files seemed to have been created by printing to them from the original text files, rather than scanning in a printed page or printing from an existing pdf file.

I couldn't get **PDF-XChange** Viewer's builtin OCR (Optical Character Reader) to do what I wanted. Simply copying the text and pasting it into MS Word produced something that would have required considerable editing to have a satisfactory result.

Having recently downloaded **PDF2Word** http://tinyurl.com/btr8ef7—I decided to make this my first use. The result, in word, looked exactly like what I'd hoped for, a copy of the PDF file, but in Word.

Round 2—a multi-page file

Having successfully converted the singlepage pdf file to word, I decided to try my hand at the 32-page file. I learned that the free version of PDF2Word will only convert three pages. It offers a \$30 version that will do more; considering the quality of conversion I saw, I believe I'd spring for it.

While checking on PDF2Word for this article, I came across this file—http:// tinyurl.com/bnurafr—listing/rating it and other similar programs. The reviewer thought highly of it.

So, I learned I couldn't get to page 28 directly using PDF2Word. So, I decided to try **PDFsam**—http://tinyurl.com/c3wnIrp—one of the PDF file splitters in my toolbox. I asked it to Burst the file into individual pages. Then, using PDF2Word on the single-page version of page 28, I again what I had hoped for—a copy of the PDF page, except in Word, and it correctly displayed a graphic from the PDF page. Later, I watched my friend edit the word page to make it what she wanted.

Round 2—a multi-page file scanned file Having had the success described above, I decided to try converting to Word a 20page PDF file consisting entirely of pages scanned from a panted source.

Even though I knew that PDF2Word could handle only three pages, I figured I'd see what it did with the first three pages of this file. It did nothing.

So, I went searching online for [pdf word ocr free]—http://tinyurl.com/bufwuh8. One site that turned up was—Top 10 Free Online OCR Tools—http:// tinyurl.com/cowm4nq. Checking its recommendations, I went for **Free Online OCR** http://free-online-ocr.com/.

I presented Free Online OCR with the 20page scanned-in document. Free Online OCR returned a Word-formatted file whose text areas seemed, to my glance, to be at least 80% accurate. It did not do well with table-formatted material.

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I then gave Free Online OCR the multipage PDF file I used in Round 2 above. The Word-formatted file it returned looked good, but the text was presented in two-line text boxes, which might be a bear to work on. Also, it had a 30-page limit, so it didn't convert the last two pages of the file

Summary

The **PDF2Word** program (by bioPDF) that I used did an excellent job of converting nonscanned PDF pages to Word format. The free version handles only up to three pages. If I were to have to convert many PDF files larger than three pages, think I'd get the paid version.

Fortunately, there's **PDFsam**, a free PDF file splitter.

There are many online OCR scanners that can convert PDF or other format files to Word. **Free Online OCR** did an ok job, but, given time, I'd check out one or more others.

FILE-OPENING PROBLEM— NO EXTENSION

You're in SPAUG, so you're smart enough to know that if you have a file with an unrecognized extension, you can search for that extension online.

But what if you receive or find a file with NO extension? I had that problem when I received such a file from a friend. I searched for [open OR view a file without extension unknown format]—http:// tinyurl.com/breyjmh. Two different hits

- http://tinyurl.com/cxeused
- http://tinyurl.com/bszq4k4

pointed me to TrID—http:// tinyurl.com/9ch96. **TrID** has a local version that you can download to your machine and an online version. The local version couldn't determine the unknown file's type, but the online version—http:// **tinyurl.com/7nwfq**—did.

MAKING MAZES

At our April 10 2013 General Meeting, John Sleeman asked me about the full-page maze I'd put into our April *Print Screen*. He also suggested using info about computergenerated mazes as Filler material. So, here goes.

I use mazes as graphic elements. Editors like graphic elements because they can be and adjusted to fill space without necessarily looking like filler. Every so often, text formatting in *Print Screen* will result in some empty space. In MS Publisher 2000, I could simply insert some boxes with as something other than simple gradients. MS gaveth, and in Publisher 2003, MS tooketh away.

One day, sitting alone in the splendor of the *Print Screen* editorial office suite, I decided to try using a maze as my space-filling graphic element.

My first step was to search for free Mazemaking software. There weren't many out there that I wanted to use:

- Amaze—http://tinyurl.com/bu75wfb
- Daedalus—http://tinyurl.com/ddy7p
- www.puz.com

The one I use most is Daedalus.

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

Here's a rough idea of how I go from blank space to maze in *Print Screen*.


1. I measure the space to be filled. For this exercise, I'll use the box below as my target.

A Mazing Space Approx. 3 x 1.6 in.

- 2. I start Daedalus
- 3. I set Maze height and width, keeping in mind that Daedalus mazes are vertical, so I'll have to rotate 90 degrees for the horizontal arrangement. In this case, my Vertical number will be about twice my Horizontal number.
- 4. I select "Create" on the menu bar
- 5. I select a pattern. Lately I've been using "More Perfect/Random" Perfect
- 6. Here's a maze I got with H=7, V=15..




 When I've got the proportions right, I check the maze for complexity—the more complex the better.
 Something to keep in mind is that in Daedalus, the path is black.
 This maze seems complex enough. I also check where



along the edges the start and end points are. For the April 2013 Print Screen, I wanted them diagonally across from each other

- I put the maze image into XnView, make it negative, and trim it.
- 9. I copy it, paste it into my MS Publisher *Print Screen* file, rotate as necessary, and adjust the size, and then the brightness and contrast to give the lines the shade of gray I want.



And the answer to John Sleeman's question about the April Maze? After I put the maze in, I decided it could represent SPAUG's history as being something of a random walk rather than a direct path, from "1982", shown as a dot-matrix printout to "2013"m shown as a QR code.

ADDING A WEBSITE'S URL TO YOUR QUICK LAUNCH SHORTCUTS

You know you can add a page's url to your Bookmarks or Favorites, but did you know you can also add it as a shortcut to your Quick Launch folder, or one of its subfolders?

Why would you want to do that? Well, it lets you group similar tools together, regardless of whether they're files on your machine or situated online.

Here's how—*Note:* These instructions are written for Win XP, some adjustment may be necessary for your situation.

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- 1. In your browser, go to the page of interest.
- Open your Quick Launch window. You can do this by right-clicking in the Quick Launch area to the right of your Start button
- 3. Click File/New//Shortcut
- 4. Copy the url from the page of interest in your browser, then paste it into the Create Shortcut window and click Next.
- 5. Name your shortcut. One way to do this is copy an appropriate from the page in your browser and paste it into the Select a Title . . . window.
- 6. Click Finish to finish creating your shortcut.

I suppose you could also put the shortcut on your desktop, but I'm not much of a desktop person.


