## March Musings from Your President by Brad Youngman

### MY CONTINUING ADVENTURE WITH WINDOWS 8.1

During February, I continued to come up to speed on Windows 8.1. My most interesting explorations involved trying two different **virtual environments** – Hyper-V and VirtualBox.

#### *Microsoft's Hyper-V*

Hyper-V is part of the services available in Windows 8.1 Pro, but not in the usual base-line Windows 8.

I turned Hyper-V on by going to “Programs and Features”/”Turn Windows features on or off” and checking “Hyper-V” in the box that opens. The machine went through something like the usual Windows update process – “Don’t turn me off, I’m busy, Leave me alone”, etc. After a few minutes it was installed.

Hyper-V is easy to use if you have used virtualizing software before.

I copied the Linux Mint 13 .ISO to the Desktop, started Hyper-V, and installed

Linux Mint. The Mint installation was straightforward and relatively fast. When the installation was complete my disappointments began. There was no USB support. There was no sound. I couldn’t cause

the Mint screen to occupy the extents of my display. This did not provide a useable instance of Linux Mint. After uninstalling Mint and Hyper-V (going back and unchecking the box in the “Turn Windows features on or off” window) I moved on to greener fields.

### *Oracle’s VirtualBox*

The greener field was provided by Oracle’s VirtualBox.

I downloaded the .exe file from Oracle and ran it. When done, I clicked the VirtualBox icon (a virtual box!) and installed Linux Mint 13 from the .ISO on the Desktop. This was a very quick process taking about 1/2 hour including the 700+ updates (think about doing a similar task in Windows).

This experience was good. I had sound. I had USB. Double clicking on the top of the Linux Mint window filled the screen. The Mint window behaved just like any normal window. To test the speed of the internet connection through VirtualBox, I pulled up YouTube and played something with action and sound. It played flawlessly – no pauses or synchronization problems. I installed Chromium (the

Linux version of Chrome), logged on to Google, synchronized my favorites bar and was off and running. I notice no perceptible loss of speed while doing normal work in Linux.

### **I recommend Oracle’s VirtualBox for Windows 8.1.**

### **A SURPRISING PROBLEM CAUSED BY A BATTERY**

We encountered an interesting problem on two computers that were brought to the Sunnyvale Senior Center Computer Lab. The problem involved Dell laptops, one brand-new and one several years old, brought in by two different people. The problem was that each computer would only rarely recognize its owner’s sign-on password. The problem made the computers unacceptable except for the very patient.

After two calls to Dell (most unhelpful) the owner of the new one was promised quick delivery of software to restore the computer, but with phone guidance from Dell India. The elderly owner was not happy. Dell wouldn’t send a technician to her home, stating that on-site service was for hardware problems only. Software was

not covered and field technicians had no software knowledge. The owner went home with an unusable computer. We received notice a couple of days later that the owner had returned the computer to Dell for a refund. End of story.

The second machine was an older Windows 7 Dell laptop with exactly the same symptoms. The owner makes backups, mostly by drag-and-drop to external USB drives. He had not backed up his last week's work on his family's taxes (for 4 or 5 relatives). If he lost it he would have to begin again. We ran Linux from a disc and copied his User profile to a backup drive. This took a couple of tries before the task was completed. Something was seriously wrong with the machine, yet Linux reported that the hard drive was good. So what was it?

Fortunately Jim Hurley, our uber-expert arrived and took charge. He had seen the problem before. He unplugged the laptop, removed the battery, and pressed the power button several times. And a few other keys for good measure. Then he re-installed the battery and plugged in the machine. All was good.

Jim explained that if a laptop is always left plugged in the battery's health is impaired. This leads to the problem seen with these two computers. He recommends that laptops be powered frequently by battery, but not to run the battery completely dead. Perhaps using the battery down to 1/4 charge once a week would prevent the problem. As a final check, we ran CHKDSK with the /s option, to fix any problem it could, and after that all was good.

### WINDOWS EASY TRANSFER CAN TAKE THE HASSLE OUT OF MIGRATING YOUR FILES TO A NEW PC

Here is something important for you Windows XP folks to do. **Go to Microsoft and download a copy of "Windows Easy Transfer"** (<http://tinyurl.com/n2zoz6>). This little program will help you move all of your data from Windows XP to your new Windows 7 or 8.1 machine. Windows Easy Transfer is built into Windows 7 and 8.1. Next month I will tell you how to use the program. Or you can go to Father Google and find out for yourself. But do get Windows Easy Transfer for XP before it disappears in April.

That's all for this month. See you at the monthly meeting at the Elks Lodge when I will demonstrate how to install Linux Mint 13, a pretty good replacement for Windows XP.

- **How much power does a computer use?**
  - Get a wattmeter and connect to power.
  - A UPS often has power usage information.
  - A Power Miser meter is available for use; it will monitor your power usage.
  - Note "wall warts" suck power all the time.

- **Firefox won't let you save a site from the main menu.**

It may be an add-on or extension issue. [N.B.- my (Stan H.) Firefox ver 27.0 saves to Favorites with

- Ctrl-d or
- click the star, or
- click the Bookmarks tab and click Bookmark This Page.
- You can save the page as a File using File-Save Page As... Check <http://tinyurl.com/kd2881k>

- **Skype setup on Win8.1 was difficult. Skype worked fine in WinXP.**

Go to "Tile World", on the left side, allow small tiles. Find Skype and click (right or left) so you can pin it to the toolbar.

- **Comparison of LibreOffice, OpenOffice.Org [now part of Apache], Google Docs.**

- Discussion: Do a Google Search to compare office suites or review computer office suites.
- There are many advantages to Google Docs.
- LibreOffice is a little more advanced over OpenOffice.org. It works well with Microsoft apps if formatting is simple. Similarly with Google Drive Docs and Spreadsheet and presentation. Powerpoint conversions are especially difficult. Be careful where you download the apps; use the official sites for download. Other sites may load crapware or worse on your computer. Photos and negatives can be fixed in the text editor.
- Office 2003 expires 8 April 2014; it would be good to switch to either a free office suite or upgrade MS Office.

- **You can still use WinXP after it expires, but there will be no updates.**

There will be some virus and malware updates (MS Security Essentials), but expect many vendors to start deprecating WinXP. Win7 has a virtual WinXP available, which would be a good alternative. Any infection would be gone the next time the virtual version is started.

- **CrossLoop is no more.** AVG bought them, and is getting out of the business. There are alternatives, Hank likes logmein (\$50/yr); it can support 2 users. Do the trial, then buy the service for the best discount. Team Viewer also is a possibility (\$100/yr).
- **For reference and news, Hank uses** CNET, PCWorld, ZDNet, Computerworld, TechNetPro, Tech Republic, Technology Review, CSO. Wall Street Journal. ZDNet seems most useful. Windowssecrets is worth the \$25/yr paid subscription.
- Hank contributed 3 copies of his **downloads of interesting articles.** Robert Mitchell will add them to the club library. They will be available for sale; contact Robert at [rfmitch66@gmail.com](mailto:rfmitch66@gmail.com) to pre-order
- **Sitting** can aggravate a tendency to cancer. You should get up every 30 minutes for at least 5 minutes. Use a timer to remind you.
- One major security issue: **PG&E Energy Statement is a scam.** It is a phishing attempt to get your information.

- **Be careful about downloading any .ZIP file;** it usually contains an .exe file that will install a virus or other malware when it is unzipped. UPS, USPS, and FedEx messages are sometimes scams. Banks, even the IRS, have been scammed. Use Firefox with the NoScript addon.
- **LinkedIn, Facebook, Instagram, Twitter** and the rest of the social sites are terrible time wasters. Best to just say NO (unless you have extra time on your hands).
- Hank has lots of **info on the coming expiration of WinXP.** There is a lot of hype and exaggeration of the problems that may occur.
  - Most infections are the result of user error responding to bogus email, or bad links.
  - **Do NOT** use Internet Explorer! Use Chrome or Firefox.
  - Many WinXP users will not switch, maybe 400M or more. Of course, Microsoft *wants* everyone to upgrade for \$\$.
  - **You do need to keep yourself safe.**
    - ◆ Use the add-ons **NoScript** and **Adblock+** with Firefox.
    - ◆ **Java is a primary source of infection.** Note you may have to allow some Java and JavaScript to use certain applications. Just allow the scripts you trust.
    - ◆ **Adobe Flash can also be a source of infections,** just by moving your mouse over the link.
    - ◆ **Malwarebytes is one of the best programs to run.** Run it from Safe Mode, and update it before running it. It's the only one Hank runs. Get a paid subscription. It will run automatically.
- ◆ **Never click links in email!** Especially if it is from an unknown source. But even friends can be infected and spread malware to you.
- **Auslogic disk defrag is a good program;** but it now comes with bloat. It now inserts a Search Conduit search engine. It can be prevented by NoScript.
- **Freeware is now uniting with other companies to add bloatware.** VLC has recently added some bloatware.
- Hank has a list of **Essential applications.** They should be on every system. Hank contributed a DVD with all the most recent Essentials to the club. Robert Mitchell will copy and make available for sale. Everyone should have the Essentials—Hank puts them on every computer he supports.
- **Paint.net is a better photo editor,** along with **Picasa.**
- **Windows Defender ISO file can be booted to cure virus and malware.**
- **An older computer can be speeded up with a Solid State Drive.** You can get older computers online, but get from a reputable dealer. Then replace the hard drive with a Solid State Drive for really fast performance.
- **Get Win7 Pro rather than Win7 Home.**
- **Dell Latitude E7240 is a really good model.**
  - Dell B760 is also good.
  - Lenovo is a good buy.
  - Other brands are not so reliable.
- **As for printers,** EPSON 4530 and 4540 models for COLOR INKJET, and almost any of the BROTHER laser printers (various models, depending on your needs) if you only want cheap, high-volume B&W printout.

- **Use the XEROX Premium Multipurpose Paper (96 bright, 24 lb.)** in ALL printing devices
- **Hank will not buy or support Win8. Win7 Pro is what he recommends,** but prefers WinXP, with Office 2003. Newer Office versions have the Ribbon, which is a totally new paradigm. So go to LibreOffice, which is free. Or run in Win7 Virtual XP mode.
- **GodMode is a useful utility to emulate the old view of the Control Panel in Win7.** Download the script to a folder and use it.
- **We're getting away from Windows. Tablets are becoming very popular.**
  - The iPad is most popular now,
  - Google Nexus 7, Samsung S4 and Chromebook are competitors and fast gaining popularity.
  - The S5 will be a very good buy with its added features.
  - Be aware the market is changing. Android, Chrome, iOS, Linux are eating away at Windows. Open OSs are the coming thing.
- **CCleaner is an excellent way to clean up the Internet Cache folder.** A single line added to the Registry can run malware hidden in your browser's cache. Run CCleaner frequently to clear the Internet Cache. Or you can set the Browser to clear the cache on shutdown.
 

Also clean the Temp folders.
- **A utility that monitors changes to the Registry is useful** to check for malware writing to the registry files.
- **Some viruses will actually disengage the antivirus software.**
- **History and Cookies are OK to keep, usually not harmful.**

CCleaner will determine good and unuseful (tracking) cookies.

#### In CCleaner

- check the boxes to clear everything in the System tab down to Fonts.
- In Advanced, leave log files.
- Internet Cache and Session should be cleared, and
- check to clear the Adobe Flash and Java.
- You can use Google to find advice from online users.
- **Use ERUNT to back up your registry.** In case of problems, boot with the Windows Repair disk and restore the Registry. Then use CCleaner to clear the Registry errors.

### JAVA, JAVASCRIPT, .NET FRAMEWORK, ACTIVE-X, ETC

JavaScript and Java are not the same. They're not even related.

- **“Java** is a computer programming language that is concurrent, class-based, object-oriented, and specifically designed to have as few implementation dependencies as possible. It is intended to let application developers "write once, run anywhere" (WORA), meaning that code that runs on one platform does not need to be recompiled to run on another.”—[Wikipedia] —<http://tinyurl.com/bc98k>
- **“JavaScript** is a prototype-based scripting language with dynamic typing and has first-class functions. Its syntax was influenced by C. **JavaScript copies many names and naming conventions from Java, but the two languages are otherwise unrelated and have very different semantics.**”—

- “.NET Framework (pronounced dot net) is a software framework developed by Microsoft that runs primarily on Microsoft Windows. ## FF ADDONS TO ENABLE/DISABLE SCRIPTING LANGUAGES—

We have heard that there may be security issues associated with software such as Java, JavaScript, Flash, etc. Firefox has several addons that let you enable or disable whether it can connect to them.

- NoScript is a must-have script-fighting addon.
- Another script controller I have on my machine is QuickJava, which “Allows quick enable and disable of Java, Javascript, Cookies, Image Animations, Flash, Silverlight, Images, Stylesheets and Proxy from the Statusbar and/or Toolbar.”

In my Opera 12.xx setup, I have put a copy of Opera’s JavaScript switch on the status bar, for easy access.

## BREAK (OR BRAKE) FOR EXERCISE

In his Feb 12 presentation, Hank Skawiski reminded us that sitting for long periods can be bad for our health.

“**Workrave** is a [free] program that . . . monitors your computer activity and frequently reminds you to take short micro-breaks and, less frequently, longer rest breaks.

### HOW TO SEND A LINK TO A GOOGLE STREETVIEW IMAGE

A friend recently took a trip to The City on a beautiful day, and did some walking around. She sent me a couple of pictures she'd taken, but didn't know some of the places she'd been. As she described what she'd seen, I developed a pretty good idea of where she'd been, but wanted to confirm it. This was obviously a job for **Google Maps' Street View**, but although I could

easily send the link to the initial map, I didn't know how to send her the link to a street-level image or closer-in overhead image, even though I'd seen them on other sites. I learned a bit more about Google maps than I'd expected to.

- **Google Maps now come in two versions—"New" and "Classic"**. Some features that were available in "Classic", including one we need here, are not available in "New"
  - Here's how to know which version you have—<http://tinyurl.com/maz7xbo>
- The procedure given via the link below is the closest one I found to what I did, so I don't have to write the whole thing myself—"How can I embed my new Google Business Virtual Tour?"—<http://tinyurl.com/mbsjzl5>. Here's some additional info for you—
  - You can skip the videos on the site. I did.
  - In **Step 1**, select the place you want to go. For this example, I want to go to this Benny Bufano St. Francis statue—<http://tinyurl.com/mat2bnr>. Digging down into my [benny bufano "st francis" San Francisco] Google search results—<http://tinyurl.com/jw43fkv>—I learned it's at Beach and Taylor—<http://tinyurl.com/mez4v2y>—so I searched for [beach and taylor sf]—<http://tinyurl.com/m9brm3u>
  - For **Step 2**, I clicked on the map at the top of the list of Google hits, which opened the Google map.
  - My default Google map version is "Classic", so I could skip **steps 3 and 4**.

I then moved the Streetview Guy to the Bay and Taylor intersection, then

clicked on the triangle that appeared, to go into street view.

I then maneuvered (translated and rotated) the street view to get the image I wanted, showing the statue and some of the surrounding area.

- For **Step 5**, I clicked the link button.
- For **Step 6**, I copied the code, which was highlighted in the top box in the pop-up info box.
- I skipped steps 7 and 8, because I now had the url I wanted.


If I was going to send the link in an email, it (in this case) was short enough (290 characters) to not be intimidating, so I'd just paste it in. If it was longer, I'd create a bit of text and paste the url as an embedded link.

For Print Screen, here's the tinyurl version—<http://tinyurl.com/l8na7g7>.

When you use this url, you are initially taken to the original Google maps image. Then the Streetview Guy pops up, followed by a large triangle. Click the triangle and you'll see the view I want you to see. The statue is hidden in the center, shaded by the trees. (See the screen capture below.) This is a "live" Google Map presentation, you can rotate, translate, and zoom it.

### SOLVING A FIREFOX–FLASH PROBLEM

A newly-installed Adobe Flash didn’t work in my Palemoon browser. Trying it with my minimally-addon’ed Firefox, it did work. It also worked when I started Palemoon with addons disabled. After about an our of disabling and enabling addons, I found the source to be Download Statusbar, which I’d had on my machine for some time.

While working on this problem, I looked at Palemoon’s Add-ons Manager/Plugins. I found Flash listed as Shockwave Flash, and, at the right-hand side of the line, a dropdown selection for Always Activate/Ask to Activate/Never Activate. I chose “Ask to Activate”. Each of the other plugins has a similar selection of choices.
