Flease read it over. If you have any suggestions or corrections, bring them to the meeting. The constitution must be passed by vote of the majority of members in attendance at this November meeting.

The end of the year includes other changes. Rebecca Eridges has volunteered to take my place as newsletter editor. Writing the newsletter is one part of the job. Getting it printed, updating the membership list, running off labels from the club member database, driving to the post office to buy stamps, folding. sealing. stamping and labeling: then mailing it are other parts. Article I. Name of organization:
THE STANFORD/PALO ALTO USERS GROUP FOR THE IBM PC
Article II. Purposes of organization:
A. To provide a forum for IBM PC (and compatible compateris) users
to discuss and cooperate on their common interests and needs;
B. To provide an interface between the University community and the business commuity on the use and applications of personal computers.

Article III. Eligibility for membership:
Regular membership is both open and limited to members of the Stanford community, namely students, faculty, and staff; Associate membership is open to any person outside the Stanford community who agrees to abide by the Constitution and policies of the Group.

Article IV. Officers
A. Titles and responsibilities:

President: Elected. May be a regular or an associate member. Coordinate the efforts of the Group's officers and committees;
Recommend individuals for appointed positions;
Establish the agenda for general membership meetings; Chair the Steering Committee meetings.
Vice-president: Elected. May be a regular or an associate member. Act in the absence of the president; Promote and coordinate the activities of Special Interest sub-groups;
Treasurer: Elected. Must be a regular member, and a currently registered student.
Handle the funds of the organization in the manner presecribed by the rules and regulations of the ASSU and the Students Organization Fund;
Receive all incoming Group monies, and pay only such expenses as approved by the Group Board.
The above three elected positions constitute the Group Board which shall have the sole authority (by a two member majority vote) to approve expenditures, sufikes, appoint_other officers, and call for special elections.
All other policies and Group actions (other than elections'and removal of elected officers) shall be voted on by the Steering Committee which will be composed of the three elected officers plus between four and twelve appointed officers, with four including one elected officer required as a quorm, and with three aye votes and a majority required for adoption. Appointed officers will include

Representative to ASSU: Appointed. Must be a regular member, and a currently registered student.
Act as liaison between the Group and ASSU.
Serve as election officer in the event a special election must be held.

Program coordinator. Appointed.
Arrange for special presentations and outside speakers for general meetings, and provide necessary logistics for such features.

Newsletter editor: Appointed. Edit and publish the Group newsletter.
B. Election of officers:

1. In October of each year the Group Board will appoint a temporary office of elections, and notify all members, both regular and associate of the opportunity to submit nominations for elected officers prior to November 15.
2. The election of officers will take place at a general membership meeting prior to Docember 15, with all members present eligible to vote, both regular and associate menbers. During said meeting, and prior to start of voting, the officer of elections will announce all nominations received and accept additional nominations. A mafority vote of those present is required for election.
3. In the event of resignation or removal of an elected officer, a special election will be held at the next general membership meeting, with the Representative to ASSU acting as election officer.
C. Removal of elected officers:
4. The office of treasurer, and the office of Represntative to ASSU shall be declared vacant immediately if the incumbent ceases to be a currently registered student.
5. Any of the the three elected officers may be removed by petition signed by three regular members and voted on in the same manner as specified in Article VI regarding amendments to the Constitution.
D. Length of term:
6. Blected officers will serve a term of one year starting January 1 , and are eligible for re-election. Elected officers chosen to fill a vacancy which occurs during the year will serve until the next December 31.
7. Appointed officers serve at the pleasure of the Group Board. Each office will be reviewed promptly after each annual election for both content of the position, and possible rotation of assignments to encourage wide participation.

Article $\nabla$. Dissolution of organization:
A. Disposition of unconmitted funds: All uncommitted funds will become the property of ASSU to use as it deems appropriate.
B. Disposition of property: All other property of the Group will be offered at auction to the members, regular or associate, in good standing at an auction annoonced to the entire membership, and any proceeds be added to the Group funds.
C. The organization shall dissolve if the number of Stanford students falls below five members in good standing, if qualified members are not voluntarily available to fill all three elected offices, or if the total membership (regular plus associate) falls below ten.

Any three members may propose an amendment to this Constitution by submitting a signed petition contiiriing the proposed change to the Group Fiepresentative to ASSU. Such a petition will be sent by mail to all members of the Group in good standing in the next regular club newsletter, and a vote taken at the next general membership meeting. Proposed amendments will be considered adopted if they receive a majority vote of all members present and in good standirig at this general membership meeting.

[^0]BOX TOP LICENSES: WHAT ARE YOUR RIGHTS?
What are your legal rights as a software user? You probably all have read the restrictive license agreements attached to software packages telling you that you are liable for everything, and the software company is liable for nothing, Several sonths ago, attorney Jack Russo talked to our group about this subject, and a recent article in the San Francisco Chronicle (11/14/84 by attorney Stephen Eljas) suened it up nicely.

First of all, are these "box-top" licenses valid? ficcording to any lagal experts, the license is not enforceable because no real negotiation took place, and under general contract law the two parties oust negotiate the contract.

As far as copying the software, there is only one situation in which you can legally make a copya for backup purposes. The Copyright Act of 1976 gives you the right to make 'archival copies." You cannot give copies to friends, nor can you eake one copy for your hone and one for your office.

The issues are a little fuzzy on whether you are allowed to sell your original software. According to the Copyright Act, you are allowed to sell or otherwise dispose of your possession without the copyright ouner's pernission. However, eost license agreenents specifically prohibit this. "Let your oun judgaent be your guide," was the advice given by attorney Elias.

## IBN'S 'TOPVIEM"

At the Second PC Fair in San Francisco last month, I sauntered over to IBN's booth to take a look at its new product, "Topliew.' The literature had run out earlier in the day fthat's what 1 get for going late in the afternoon on the last day of the fair) so everything l's telling you 35 straight fron the deso the l明 account exerutive gave ae. I was pleasantly surprised that this guy was not your typical laker: he was in need of a shave and wasn't even wearing a white shirt.

Anyway, Topliew is an iepressive product that conbines sulti-tasking with windows. You can set up windows, each
contajning a different application package. Topyien wi!l allom you to have sosething printing or processing in the background while you are working on a different application in the foreground. Additionally, data can easily be transferred between the concurrently running applications.

It sounds an amful lot like hicroSoft Hindoms, doesn't it? Looks like MicroSoft aissed the boat. Hindows fias already been delayed three or four tiees and will not be released until next sumer. (Has microSoft given us any reason to believe this laterst release date?). On the other hand, Toplien is scheduled to appear on the shelver. "sonetime in the first quarter of 1995".

In the demonstration I sam, the IBM Writing fissistant (aka PFS Write) and Multiflan were running sioultaneously. Mith a fen clicks of the mouse, data was copied froe a spreadsheet into a document file, You do not need to convert the data, nor do you need to exit one progran and load another.

You get many of the advantages of an integrated progran, plus the ability to use your favorite; full-featured applications.

Presently the list of compatible software is comprised solely of IBH packages. Never fear, though: nost of the popular software packages will be TopView-compatible by the tien the progras is releaset. IBM has given ajar software companjes (e.g., Lotus Developaent) the specifications to allow their prograss to take full advantage of Topliew's capabilities.

Topliem works with $\operatorname{DOS} 2.0,2.1$ and 3.0 (and possibly 1.1). You will mant to have lots of RAM if you purchase this applications manager. Together, Topliew and DOS eat up about 175 K , which does not leave you with much roon for your applications. For example, if you manted to run Multinate (256K) concurrently with $1-2-3$ (128K) you will only be able to build a relatively sall worksheet even if you have a fully loaded PC (640K).

IBn has aggressively priced Topvien at $\$ 149$.

PC-AT Demand far exceeds supply and IBM has declined to take orders past November. Future Computing has reported that IBM was prepared to seil 60,000 AT's before the end of the year, but that volume appears to be inadequate.

The hot-selling AT is expected to cut deeply into sales of the AT\&T PC and the Compact Deskpro, which had been counting on the faster execution speed of their 8086 processors.

A shortage of 1.2 megabyte floppy diska has manufacturers scurrying to meet the unexpected demand from PC AT users. IBM says that the floppies will not be available until November 1. Other manufacturers are expected to have diskettes available in the near future. Second party companies say that they could have had 1.2 megabyte diskettes available in quantity if IBM had given them 2 months advance notice.

PC AT memory cards in short supply? Many dealers say that IBM has failed to deliver adequate supplies of the 128 K memory expansion cards thar bring the AT up to a full 640K. Dealers reportedly have hundreds of $512 \mathrm{~K} \mathrm{AT}^{\prime}$ s on the shelf that were ordered as 640 K systems.

RUMOR. The PC2 from IBM will be available in 30 days. It will be built around the Intel 80186 with all 8088 software compatibility problems solved. IBM is expected to cut the price of the PC by another $20 \%$ and offer an upgrade in the form of a daughter-board that plugs into the 8088 socket. This could be the knockout punch for many of the PC clones.
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
