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# DIAL-A-GROUP

Dave Casto, who spends nearly 5 hours a week talking to prospective members, reports on his adventures as Membership Chairman:

Our Group's telephone (326-7006..or dial DAM-SOON) is listed in several computer publications, primarily to permit prospective members to contact us. It is usually on an answering machine, volunteering to send membership information, or to return the call.

We average one inquiry per day, 40% from local folks to ask about joining. Another 20% are from more distant Bay Area callers who have not found a PC User Group in their communities. Once a month or so comes an inquiry from Third World places like England, Japan, South Africa, Italy, and New York. To each we send a description of our Group's activities, and application blank, and a map of the campus.

About 25% of the calls are from folks not interested in joining, who would like help with specific problems. With a few exceptions, we have to decline. The remaining calls are from vendors of all kinds, whom we invite to send literature, or to advertise in the newsletter. pitches are quite varied, and to date we have not found an effective way to separate the wheat from the chaff, nor an efficient way to expose all the opportunities to all of membership. Like the voluminous stuff that comes in the mail, most of the vendor calls are not anything you cannot live without, but quite a few are tempting to investigate.

# DISK DRIVE HEAD CLEANING

Appalled at the advice in the instructions of Datalife to clean daily, after noting that the two expensive fluid-saturated cleaning disks cannot be used again because they dry out soon once their storage bags are unsealed, I knew that there must be a more economical way.

The way is so obvious, that I felt the method is not widely recommended because of the risk of blame should a drive malfunction soon after treatment. However, true progress must sometimes run the chance of a few lawsuits. But I will state the disclaimer that should someone's drive decide to make it look like the method described herein has adversely affected it, I plead that I have never had any trouble, and further, that if of meek temperament, please seek other opinions before trying what I believe is perhaps the best technique of disk drive head cleaning. The following uses the DATALIFE KIT.

Boot up your computer - Remove all disks - Type TYPE XXXX - Place a Datalife cleaning disk on a towel - Spray it with a good quality degreaser (from Zacks, Chemtronics, FREON\*TF, C2480, 24 ozs, \$5.98) - Spray 4 to 5 times around the disk until it appears uniformly damp - Turn it over and repeat - Insert the damp disk into the floppy holder - Feed into the default drive (a) - Hit RETURN - Keep hitting R (for Retry) for about 15 seconds - Remove from drive - Remove cleaning disk from holder.

Change default drive to R Type XXXX - Renew fluid to
cleaning disk until similarly damp
as before - Insert into floppy

holder - Feed into drive B - Hit RETURN - Keep hitting R for about 15 seconds as for A drive - Remove from drive - Remove cleaning dis! immediately from holder (holder might dissolve otherwise) and store in its container - Leave computer on for cooling air to dry drive innards - Drives should be safe for disk insertion after a few minutes.

Daily treatment must be needed only for constant use of drives. Once a month is my practice. Anyhow, the 24 oz. can will last a long time, even for frequent use.

#### TRUE BASIC

The original developers of BASIC have just announced a new version of this popular programming language. They are calling it TRUE BASIC.

According to an InfoWorld article (1-21-85), "True Basic features Englishlike syntax, on-line help, a full-screen editor, windows..." It also is capable of using the maximum memory of your PC, instead of only 64K. True Basic also can take advantage of an 8087 chip.
