MAY MEETING

Several members demonstrated three DOS shell file managing programs: Q-DOS, 1DIR, and XTREE. These programs allow you to transfer files between directories on your hard disk, display a diagram of your subdirectories, and permit batch processing of selected files. By allowing you to choose DOS commands and file names off of menus, you will be able to reduce typing errors.

Jim Caldwell demonstrated the first program: 1DIR by Bourbaki. 1DIR is a \$79 programmable, memory resident program. However, it can't search for a file in more than one directory, nor can it remove or create directories.

Jim seemed to prefer Q-DOS over 1DIR. Q-DOS will look across directories to find a file and shows a graphic representation of your directory tree. This \$29.95 program is published by Gazelle Systems.

Jay Fox demonstrated XTREE by Executive Systems. Like Q-DOS, XTREE can search across subdirectories for a file and shows a picture of the tree. In addition, this program includes a program for backing up a hard disk onto floppies. XTREE retails for \$49.95.

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DISK OF THE MONTH

The Disk of the Month is Directory Scanner, a public domain utility similar to the XTREE program which was demonstrated at the May meeting. The file DS.ARC is in archived (compressed) form so you will need to de-archive it with ARC.EXE (also included on the disk).

The Disk of Month can be purchased at the back of the room at the June meeting. You can use your Goodie Coupon or bring \$2.

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BETTER BACKUPS

Because of technical difficulties, Jim Dinkey was unable to demonstrate the BAKUP program at the May meeting. Assuming Murphy's Law doesn't prevail again, Jim will demo BAKUP at the June meeting. This program allows more control and feedback over the backing up of a hard disk. Unlike DOS's BACKUP program, it backs up files so that they can be read individually. This program also provides a catalog of your backup disks and files.

NEW IBM KEYBOARD

IBM's new enhanced keyboard is now an option for those purchasing IBM personal computers. The keyboard has cursor control keys separate from the numeric keypad, light indicators for NumLock, Caps Lock and Scroll Lock, and larger shift keys.

However, a bug in DOS 3.2 causes some operations to not recognize the new cursor keys. For example, the cursor keys will not work in edit mode in BASICA. Fortunately, IBM has released a patch fix which users can copy from their dealers.

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FINANCIAL NAVIGATOR

As one member pointed out at the May meeting, pages iv and vi of the Financial Navigator's Installation Checklist were reversed. John Van Deman informed us that this was corrected in April and all products shipped will receive the corrected pages (not just an errata sheet).

The above descriptions are for new files added to the library during June '85.

The file DS.ARC is a beautiful file management program very similar to XTREE (except this one is free). It was made by LCDR Nat Martino, U.S. Naval Academy omputer Science Dept. Annapolis, MD. The documentation is excellent, you can run the program on Mono or Color (even set your own colors). Press H or ? and a screen of all commands comes up. I have been using 1DIR for the manipulation of the library file work and I find this program much better.

You will note this file is named DS.ARC; Use ARC.EXE which is on disk File-Mgr #OB to dearchive it. You will also find LIST.COM and QUICKEYS.COM in the DS archive. These are helpful in reading the files and speeding up the cursor. After reading the document you should have no trouble in running these.

THE MAKING OF

Members ask me from time to time how I edit our monthly newsletter: how I print the mailing labels, which word processor I use, how I get the column format, etc. For those who are curious, read on.

Good ol' dBase II helps me maintain our mailing list of almost two hundred members. Our Financial Manager, Beverly Altman, keeps me posted on new members, and who has renewed. After deleting those whose membership has expired, I then print the mailing labels.

OfficeWriter by Office Solutions is the word processor I use for PrtSc for several reasons: (1) I received a free copy of the program to write a review for PC World last May and I fell in love with it. (2) It does columns.

The columns must be typed on separate pages and are later placed side by side during print time. I have discovered that it is easier to lay out the pages on paper as opposed to on the screen. Therefore, I print the text, cut apart each article, and experiment with different arrangements.

Once I have fit the puzzle pieces together satisfactorily, I use Office-Writer's Move command to cut and paste the text electronically. I leave blank space for the cartoons, figures, and the calendar, and paste them in after the final copy is printed.

Joann Conners takes over the production once the copies return from The Copy Shop in Palo Alto. She personally folds, staples and stamps each newsletter with her tender loving care. The Post Office gets to take credit for the occasional mutilation of our newsletters. (Has anyone else ever received a severely abused newsletter two weeks after the meeting, enclosed in a plastic baggie?!)

UNFORMATTING?

I never thought I'd see the day, but someone has come out with a program which will restore data that has been erased by accidental disk formatting.

The Mace Utilities retail for \$69.95 and sound like something every hard disk owner should own. If the utilities are loaded on the hard disk before it is reformatted, a restore command can resurrect your disk. If you had not previously installed the program before reformatting, you can still recover all files in the subdirectories. It cannot restore the root directory files, however.

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REVIEW: PRINTMASTER

Printmaster is a versatile graphics program designed to produce personalized greeting cards, signs (flyers), banners, letterheads and several types of calendars. It is extremely simple to use, and will solve the problem of last minute searching for birthday or other special occasion cards.

It comes with 8 type fonts, 11 border designs and 111 ready to use pre-designed graphics. It also has a built-in graphics editors to design your own graphics.

The program gives you plenty of variety in type styles, picture designs, and layout for most occasions. If you have access to a photo-copier, a little "cutting and pasting" will give you all the variety you need. The program is menu-driven and will guide you through the whole procedure with little need to use the manual. The manual does have several samples for lay-out design that are useful to get started.

One thing the manual does not tell you is that if you forget to use the printer set-up procedure, your program will crash when you get to the print design stage. This happened to me three times, and each time I had to start from step 1 and go through the whole design procedure again before I realized the problem. This could have been avoided with a warning in the manual, or better yet on the set-up menu itself.

The program allows you to position the graphics where you like them, but neither the manual nor the program tells you exactly where your wording will be placed in relation to the picture designs. However, before you print the final design, it will be placed on the screen for you to see and there are provisions for going back to "edit" your work.

You can "save" your designs and recall them for later printing. Unfortunately you can not edit the saved designs. This is too bad, as sometimes you may have created a "masterpiece" which you would want to use again by simply changing the name.

All in all, this is an excellent program. You need not be an artist nor a computer genius to operate it. A session with this program will take care of all your greeting card needs. I highly recommend it. An additional graphics supplement, Art Gallery I, gives you 140 more designs to play with. My enthusiasm for the Printmaster program immediately prompted me to go out and purchase Art Gallery I too.

The list price is \$59.95. However, I picked up my copy of Printmaster at the Wherehouse Audio and Video outlet in Redwood City for \$39.97. Art Gallery I goes for \$26.97 and is a nice addition to the package. The program is copy protected, but the publisher will send you a backup for \$5 when you register.
