## MARCH MEETING

---

Bob Schwabach, an expert in on-line investment research and analysis, explained how a computer can be used to maximize investment income. He researched hundreds of programs, and found 3 or 4 that he liked.

Bob believes whole-heartedly in technical analysis, which basically says there is no correlation between a stock's price and how well the company is doing. Because technical analysis relies heavily on numbers and charts, a computer is an ideal tool for tracking and analyzing stock information.

The Technician (\$500) was one program Bob recommends and uses regularly. For \$10/month, you can download data from the software company each day. This program does not track individual stocks; rather, it keeps track of the overall market. For example, it tracks advances/declines, member/public purchases and odd lot buying/selling.

Bob thinks Dow Jones' program, Market Analyst, is a good program but has horrible documentation.

The MediStock program tracks individual stocks, bonds, and commodities. Though it tracks the overall market somewhat, it doesn't have as many analytical tools as The Technician. It must be used with an outside database service, such as Hale in Palo Alto.

Bob said that Lotus, or any other spreadsheet, cannot begin to approach what these dedicated stock analysis programs can do.

RAM drives (public and commercial) were demonstrated. This became exciting when responding to a query of how to de-compress (de-ARC) a file, where it would then exceed the disk size in a system having just floppy drives. When we failed with SUPERDRV (AST corp) & SOFTDISK (Sigma Designs) to make a 450Kbyte ram-drive that worked, we made our own from VDISK.ASM. This entailed re-editing the ASM file; assembling, linking, and converting it to a COM file. Invoking it as an out-sized ram-drive then permitted de-ARcing a large file into it. From there, it can be edited it into smaller chunks.

Ron Gable brought some more disks full of files from other clubs. Again, directories will be given to Turley Angle to determine which files the library lacks.

As a continual agenda item, attendees will be encouraged to cite their methods of organizing the variety and breadth of computer material.

As the regulars get more advanced, new people might not get proper attention. Therefore, from 6 to 7:30pm, a run-through of fundamentals like: computer environment; drive cleaning; AUTOEXEC.BAT; batch files; CONFIG.SYS; BASICA; ARC files; LIBCAT; file management (concatenating, searching,

subdirectories, combining directories); and computer care; will be done even if only one person wants it.

It's time to repeat that this group can't always cope with application package questions, mainly because there are just too many packages, and we all have our favorites. But, we have a roster indicating which packages people use. It would be useful to expand this club wide. The answer may not have to wait so long, if more possibles are a few phone calls away.

DISK OF THE MONTH

The Disk of the Month features LIST, a handy utility for viewing ASCII files in DOS. Unlike the DOS TYPE command, LIST allows you to view the file as if you are in a word processor: you can move the cursor around the file, scroll up and down, and even position the cursor with a search command. It's very simple to use: simply type LIST followed by the name of the file you wish to view.

Because of the levying of tariffs on Japanese products, buyers are snapping up Japanese laptop computers. Retailers and consumers are concerned the tariffs will cause shortages and price increases of these computers, and consequently have stepped up their purchases. One retailer reported panic buying and said sales were up 40 percent last weekend.

NEC anticipates being able to meet the demand for its machines, while Toshiba predicts it may have to ration laptops to its dealers.

Laptop computers are the product in which consumers are expected to most notice the effect of the recently imposed 100% tariffs.

#### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

(by Daniel Vance, reprinted from the Tucson Computer Society, February 1987)

Q. What are the . and .. directories listed in all my subdirectories on my hard disk?

A. The . and .. directories are DOS's notations to mark the current subdirectory (.) and the parent subdirectory (...). You can use these notations to your advantage to speed up typing DOS commands. For example, if you are in a subdirectory called C: WORDPERF ARTICLES and you wanted to list the files in the C: WORDPERF directory, instead of typing "DIR C: WORDPERF", you can type "DIR..". To change from the current directory to the parent, type "CD..".

#### GRANT TRACKER

GRANT TRACKER is a simple, common-sense bookkeeping program that allows you to keep TRACK of the financial status of your grants, with up-to-the-minute displays of FUNDS AWARDED, EXPENSE-TO-DATE, COMMITMENTS and BALANCES, and information on all PERSONNEL.

After entering the correct PASSWORD, the First Menu asks you to enter the official numbers of your grants (e.g., CA01234-09) and a shortened version (i.e., nickname) of the official names of your grants. After entering this information, this Menu is used to select the grant that you want to work on.

The Main Menu gives you access to all of the other features of GRANT TRACKER; i.e., ENTER, CORRECT, PRINT, SEARCH, and WHAT-IF calculations. You ENTER the information from your grant award statement, salaries and information on your employees, all items of expense as they occur (e.g., purchase orders, etc.), expenses-to-date from your Institution's monthly Expenditure Statement, and the computer automatically calculates your COMMITMENTS and BALANCES.

The SEARCH routine allows you to list and total your expenses in any particular category (e.g., photography, reprints, travel, etc.); to find a given purchase order by number; to search for orders that are closed or open (i.e., paid for or not); to search for specific items ordered, or to search for a specific vendor.

GRANT TRACKER will get your grant budgets under control!

Because the price of floppy drives have come down so much, it hardly seems worthwhile to get a drive repaired anymore. However, Jim Dinkey announced at the last meeting that there are some local repair outfits that will repair drives for a reasonable amount. One such place, for example, will adjust the alignment for \$19.95 and perform diagnostics for \$12.50. Their number is (408) 436-1530.

**IBM'S NEW COMPUTERS**

Earlier this month, IBM announced the new Personal System/2, consisting of four new models. The machines range in price from \$1,695 to \$10,995.

We are fortunate to have a representative from IBM, J.B. Burke, to discuss these new products in further detail at the April 29th meeting. Here's some general information about the announcement.

The original PC will be discontinued, though IBM intends to keep selling its XT and AT models at reduced prices. One XT model will be cut in price by 34 percent to \$1,395.

The Model 30 uses the 8-bit Intel 8086 processor and is up to 2-1/2 times faster than the PC XT. The Model 50 and 60 use the 16-bit Intel 80286 chip and are up to twice as fast as the PC AT. The top of the line Model 80 is a 32-bit computer which is up to 3-1/2 times faster than the PC AT.

All the models use a 3.5 inch floppy disk drive. The Model 30 and 50 have 20MB hard drives while the Model 60 and 80 come with either 44, 70 or 115MB drives.

The new operating system by Microsoft will be available later this year. Operating System/2 offers the ability to carry out multiple tasks at once. Most of the current IBM application software will run on the new operating system. However, earlier machines will not run new applications written for the new operating system.

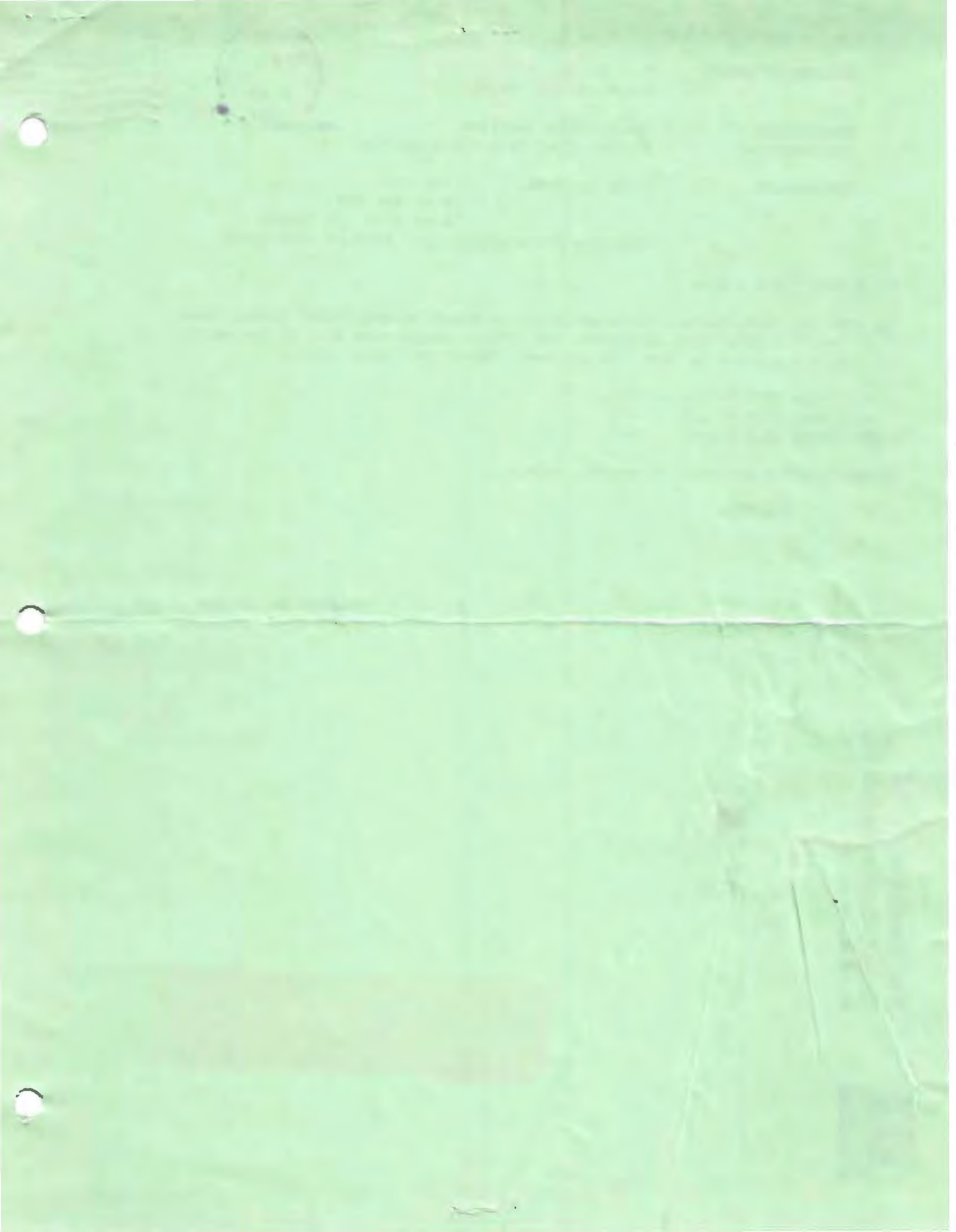

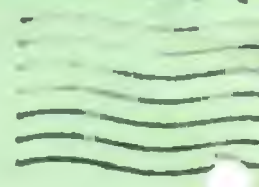
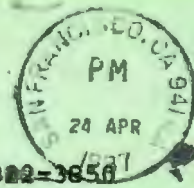
