#### Disk of the Month

Two directory-listing utilities will be on the Disk of the Month: SDIR50 and SDIRX. Each of these programs offers something unique. SDIR50 shines at showing hidden files, attributes, sub-directories, providing a pause for each screen full, and can even change file attributes. Unfortunately, the directory listing cannot be redirected to a file.

SDIRX gives a nice compact sixcolumn directory listing which can be redirected to a file. It can also sort according to date, size, etc. More detailed description would steal thunder from the demonstration planned for the next meeting. A text file will also be included which compares the gamut of such directory listers (excluding commercial programs). Copies of Disk of the Month will be available at the back of the room for \$1.

We recognize SPAUG as an interface between the University and Palo Alto residents and businesses. I want to implement a number of programs to bring us closer to students and the University family:

- 1) Establish new Special Interest Groups (SIG) that are responsive to student needs and which should meet on campus. As examples: A Student Novice SIG; A DOS SIG; Some special ones on FORTRAN, BASIC, "C," word processing, and theses by computers.
- Make a Disk Library and the BBS more widely available to a larger fraction of the University.
- Involve more of the University staff and students as speakers, SIG leaders, etc.

For the general membership, I intend to explore the feasibility of special meetings besides the monthly general meeting. The informational levels of the special meetings will be somewhat higher than for general meetings. Indeed, some may be very technical sessions of particular interest only to "power users" and, I hope, to a number of students.

Also, for the general membership, I'll be particularly interested in increasing the number of SIGs so as to promote exchange of views. As to improving the composition of the general meetings, a number of minor changes need to be made, but special emphasis will be placed on getting speakers who can address a variety of broad topics succinctly, for example, business and financial systems.

I'd like to say more, but this is certainly not the place to air all my plans; just enough to let you know the trend of my intentions. Although the current groups of volunteers will help implement these plans, many more are needed; please let us know what you want to do to help.

I hope you'll express confidence in my goals by casting a vote for me.

This enables me to be tuned to the needs and interests of more of the members, especially when it comes time to assist with topic and speaker planning and to make sure that speakers' techno-talk gets translated. #### **DISKOVERIES**

#### Symphony 2.0

Most people would agree that Symphony's weakest area is its word processing. No on-screen page breaks or page numbering. Manual paragraph formatting. Awkward print attributes. No spelling checker.

Symphony's database has been the second focal point of complaints. Modifying a database – namely, adding and deleting fields – was such a cumbersome process and frustrating experience, that it was sometimes easier to scrap the database and start over.

Until Symphony Release 2.

Symphony Release
2 includes a number of additions and enhancements to all the environments (except graphics). Those who upgrade to this version will appreciate the many different improvements to the program, including the removal of copy protection.

#### Word Processing

The word processing environment is the main benefactor of the Release 2 changes. Some of the most important improvements are:

- You can now see page breaks and page numbering on screen.
- Paragraphs automatically reformat after editing changes.
  - · You can undelete text.
- Print attributes (e.g., underlining)
   are easier to enter.
- Print attribute codes do not display in your text; the attributed text stands out on your screen.
  - Short-cut, or "accelerator," keys are offered for most commands.

In addition, two add-in programs are included for use with the DOC environment: a spelling checker and a text outliner. These add-ins were formerly sold as separate products.

Those who upgrade to Symphony 2.0 will appreciate the many improvements, including the removal of copy protection.

#### Database

It used to be a nightmare to add or delete fields in a Symphony database. So many database ranges are affected by field insertions and deletions, that it was easy to forget to change one of the ranges.

If you did, you would get the dreaded "range mismatch" message. Unless you really understood what you were doing and knew how to fix this error, your database could be rendered useless.

These disasters and hassles are minimized in Release 2. The Field command on the FORM menu provides options for moving, inserting, and deleting fields in the data entry form (see figure 3).

#### Spreadsheet

Because the spreadsheet is Symphony's strongest environment, it's not surprising that Release 2 offers only a few enhancements to this area. Three new commands are available which are useful in the SHEET environment.

The new SHEET Settings Zero command will "hide" the contents of all cells with a value of zero. Just like in 1-2-3, this command is a temporary setting; you must reset Zero to Yes after each time you retrieve the file.

With the SERVICES Configuration Other International Negative command you can choose how negative numbers will display – in parentheses or with a leading minus sign. This configuration setting only applies to negative numbers in the Currency and Punctuated formats.

Another recalculation method is offered in Release 2: Optimal. This method turns on minimal recalculation so that Symphony only recalculates the cells which are affected by changes. This method is faster than any of the methods formerly offered because it doesn't recalculate the entire worksheet — only the formulas affected by changes.

#### Communications

Because setting up a configuration file can be the most difficult part of communications, Symphony 2.0 includes five configuration files for connecting with popular information services. You can use the files as they are given to you, or you can modify them as needed. The CCF files included are ADP, COMPUSRV, DOWJONES, MCI, and SOURCE.

In addition, an application add-in for DEC VT 100 terminal emulation is included. When the VT100 application add-in is attached, a new menu option appears (COMM Settings Terminal VT100), and a new settings sheet appears under the standard communications settings sheet.

#### How it Rates

Is Symphony Release 2.0 worth the upgrade cost of \$150? The word processing add-ins (Spelling Checker and Text Outliner) alone could make it worth your while to upgrade, since these products formerly sold for \$150 a piece. I personal-

ly have grown "attached" to the Text Outliner, and don't write anything without outlining it first.

If you have been avoiding Symphony's word processing because of its antiquity, I think the new features and improvements will entice you to do more of your letter, memo, and report writing in DOC mode. And if you are already a faithful user of Symphony's word processor, you'll be thrilled with the enhancements. However, I must mention that these enhancements are nothing innovative in the word processing world and are simply Lotus' way of catching Symphony up to other word processors.

Database designers will certainly welcome the new database Field commands as they will save many hours of hair-pulling during database modification.

And everyone will appreciate the hassles eliminated by the removal of copy protection. You can now use disk optimizer and backup programs without worry, and if your hard disk crashes, you don't need to call Lotus to send you a replacement disk.


